THREATEN TO SLAY ALL FOREIGNERS IN COUNTRY

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Admiral Howard, commanding the Pacific fleet, was under orders today to proceed immediately to Guaymas, on the west coast of Mexico, with 300 bluejackets and 200 marines, and to dispatch this force to two miles inland, if necessary, to protect Americans managed by the Yagui Indians.

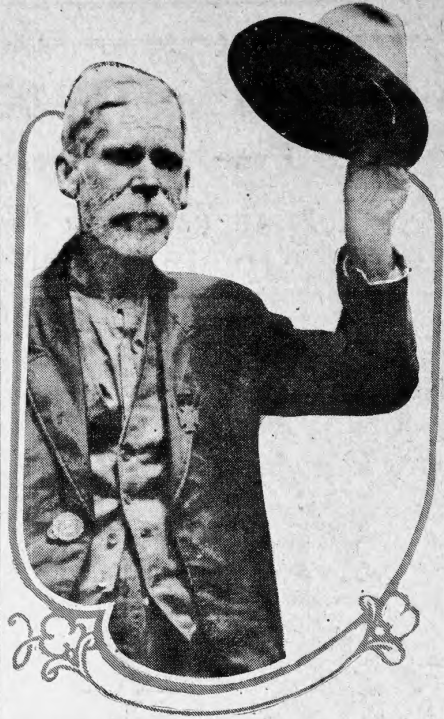

WALKED TO RICHMOND TO ATTEND REUNION

Grizzled Civil War Veteran, Who Tramped 500 Miles to See Comrades Again, Passes Through Atlanta

"I feel a little trampled," admits Arthur Pope Murray, veteran, who walked from Murfreesboro, Tenn., to Richmond, Va., to attend the recent reunion, and who passed through Atlanta Thursday, on route back to his home by easy stages.

The veteran, who wanted so badly to see his comrades of the battle again, that he walked 500 miles over two mountain ranges, is frail looking and slight of stature.

"I went into the war before I was sixteen," he explains, "and the hardship must have stunted my growth." There were two veterans who walked to the Richmond reunion from distant points. The other was George W. Sherman, of Forsyth, Ga.

"He told me that it took him thirty days to walk to Richmond, but I heard him tell a crowd of people that he left home on the 4th of May—that was about the 25th of May—and I don't see how he can have done it in thirty days."

During the four years of the war Mr. Murray was with Kemper's battery, the Alexandria Light Infantry. The veteran hiker is a native Virginian, and says his was one of three families which settled where Alexandria now stands.

Returning home he is visiting various battlefields, and is being "passed" by the city wardens from place to place. Thursday City Warden Tom Evans furnished him transportation to Chattanooga.

As he was leaving the warden's office, Mr. Murray glanced at the headlines of a newspaper. "Those fellows in Europe are not doing any fighting," he said. "Why, the Civil war, we got close together."

PLANS TO STOP THEFT OF MILITARY PROPERTY

Adjutant General Nash Asks Co-operation of County Sheriffs

Adjutant General J. Van Holt Nash is determined to put a stop to the many thefts of national guard uniforms, shirts and hats, and has mailed out notices to the county sheriffs in Georgia urging that they make it plain to the public that it is not only a violation of the federal laws to steal military equipment, but that it is an equally grave offense for any person to sell, buy or wear such equipment, and that persons who make such purchases in good faith are not only liable to prosecution in the federal courts but can have no title in the property bought.

There have been many thefts of military clothing from the armories in Georgia, says General Nash, and it has not been an infrequent thing to see persons in no way connected with the militia wearing the uniform hats and shirts, and in many instances the full uniforms.

General Nash says that recently a United States deputy marshal, while on business in a north Georgia county, came upon a farmer plowing in a field who wore a khaki uniform with the buttons and other insignia still attached. This uniform was inscribed with the marks of Company K, Fifth regiment, of Atlanta. The deputy marshal made the farmer strip right in the field and took the uniform from him and brought it back to Atlanta. No case was made against him because he had bought the clothing from some one who had gone through north Georgia with a quantity of such equipment and which this person offered for sale of very low prices.

Privilege and Paving

A street is repaved. No car line is on it. The city pays one-third of the cost—the pavement's to be used by the general public. The property owners pay the two other thirds, because their investment is enhanced by the improvement.

Another street is to be repaved. There's a car line on it. The property owners get together and agree. They secure the city's approval. Then we're notified of what's been decided. We're told to pay for so many feet of the pavement selected by others: 11 feet if the car line is single track, 16 feet if it's double. The city and property owners share in three parts the portion of cost that remains.

We know that often our quite permissible interest in the cost and other details of paving is overlooked through no deliberate intent. Sometimes our expression of that interest is not welcomed.

In a few instances it may be met as an intrusion, as if we are privileged unkindly in being on the street at all.

We submit that isn't entirely fair. We pay much to the public for the privilege of earning its nickels—but we pay it in specific form, as franchise tax, as tax on our gross revenues. Paving charges buy no privilege. They buy nothing but pavement.

We're not reluctant to spend money wisely. We're not obstructive of public improvement. We are entitled, by plain right, to at least a voice in the discussion when it concerns money we must spend.

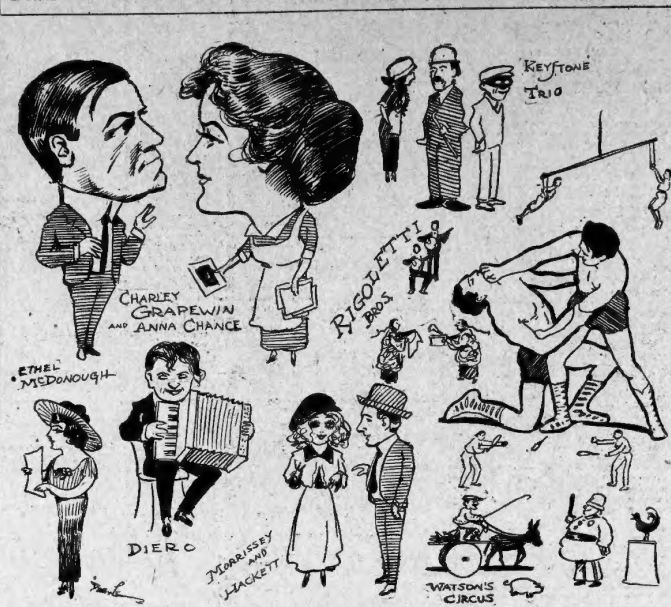

The Stupendous Cost.

Premier Asquith's statement that England's war expenditures during the next three months will be not less than fifteen million dollars daily indicates the stupendous cost of the European struggle.

Aside from such matters, the financial strain upon all the nations involved is tremendous. It is estimated that their aggregate debts, which were some eighteen billion dollars twelve months ago, will have increased by the end of the current year to seventy-five billions.

How will these mountainous burdens be carried when the fighting is over and the desolate reaction of war sets in? To the victors, the problem will be difficult enough; but to the vanquished, it will be well nigh crushing.

For years the load of taxation in Germany has been apparently all that the mass of the people could bear. What, then, will be the result if Germany loses and is forced to pay large indemnities in addition to the enormous expense which she is incurring on her own account?

The Krupp family have subscribed to the war fund, probably on the idea of having their bread returned buttered.

Some people say hope can't be raised in the south, and yet an Alabama hog was big enough to wreck an automobile.

Not Worth the Price.

The sinking of British ships by German submarines is rather impressive as reported from day to day, but when measured by the extent of British commerce the total effect of these undersea raids seems almost trivial.

Italy's decision doubtless swayed them still further in that direction, and the triumph of Venizelos in Greece will not be lost upon the diplomats of Bucharest and Sofia.

In May exports amounted in value to \$198,000,000, not including the immense war supplies shipped to the continent for carrying on the military operations. The exports in January, before the submarines began sinking British merchantmen, amounted to \$141,000,000, and in August of last year they amounted to only \$121,000,000.

In the light of this record, it appears that while the Kaiser's submarine war has done damage it has not affected the enemy's fortunes materially and that its achievements at the most are scarcely worth the forfeiture of the neutral world's good will.

Soil Surveys in Georgia.

The Georgia College of Agriculture in co-operation with the national Department of Agriculture is making a soil survey of Wilkes county. The report, says an official announcement, will discuss in detail the character of the soils, their suitability to various crops together with the most advantageous use of fertilizers, and will be accompanied by a map showing in colors the location of the different soils with reference to roads, water courses, schools, churches and other natural and social features.

The value of such surveys is incalculable. Their complete and reliable information is of immediate benefit to farmers and of far-reaching service to the people's every interest. They afford a solid basis for definite enterprises on the part of boards of trade and chambers of commerce. They reveal the community's needs and opportunities, and furnish guidance to forward movements. When every county in Georgia has been thus surveyed—and in due course every one will be—the path of the State's progress will be broadened immeasurably.

The Omens From Greece.

The recent elections in Greece were largely in the nature of a referendum to decide whether that nation should remain neutral or cast its lot with the Allies. King Constantine, a brother-in-law of the Kaiser, has counseled peace and has been seconded by a group of conservatives. Venizelos, former premier and the country's ablest statesman, has urged war and has been supported by those whose dream is of a greater Hellas.

This does not mean inevitably that Greece will enter the war, but all omens point that way. Before final action is taken, several diplomatic issues must be settled, notably those with Bulgaria concerning matters of territory, and those with Italy regarding rival interests in the Aegean.

The mass of the Greeks trust Venizelos implicitly to bargain well for their kingdom's diplomatic interests and to guide it toward a golden future. His leadership in the Balkan wars and in the ensuing negotiations was brilliant and fruitful.

The military service which Greece could render the cause of the Allies, though not especially great, would be distinctly worth while. The Greek army on a war footing numbers approximately a quarter of a million men.

It appears more and more probable, however, that the Balkan Governments will act virtually in concert. That is to say, if they can agree among themselves as to territorial problems they can go further and agree so to the part each can best play in taking up arms.

The Italian soldier is not only severely drilled but he is also expected to perform a good many duties not usually regarded as falling within the requirements of military service. It is considered incumbent on every man wearing the King's uniform to give aid whenever and wherever it may be needed for the protection of life and property, against crime, accident or disaster, and whenever a calamity befalls as the recent earthquake—the first move is always to send troops to assist the suffering.

Editorial Echoes

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I can never speak in praise of war. But there is this peculiar distinction belonging to the soldier, that he goes into an enterprise out of which he himself cannot get anything at all. He is giving everything that he hath, even his life, in order that others may live, not in order that he himself may obtain gain and prosperity.

The arm chair will get you if you don't watch out! Mark Twain proved by statistics that lying in bed was the most deadly of occupations. Now the United States Public Health Service tells that every chair, upholstered or plain, is rife with germs that kill. Primitive man was very much on the jump. He was so sorry on his feet that heart and kidney disease, appendicitis and indigestion were not able to work him into a corner and land a knockout. Superb footwork saved our ancestors from degeneration at forty. Walk. Don't stroll, go at a pace that will stretch the stagnant muscles and rock the vital organs that were not intended to sleep twenty-four hours.

Editor The Journal: Macon, Ga., June 16, 1915.

There has been so much said in the past few months about the Dixie highway, the route to Florida, that it appeared to me that these counties, and the entire route, should begin immediately the construction of permanent roads, properly located and graded to the best possible grades and with as many curves eliminating as possible.

After mature thought, I decided that this might be a great opening for the able civil engineers throughout the state of Georgia, this condition being brought about by the war stopping all development of a private nature.

Feeling the needs of the various counties through which this highway passes, I wrote a personal letter to each board of county commissioners, suggesting that some steps be taken to make these permanent improvements, but as yet have not heard from any of them.

It strikes me that the press of the state could do nothing that would be of a more lasting benefit to the state, counties, towns and citizens of the entire state than to settle this question and bring forward a campaign of education to the county boards and the citizens at large, of the entire state of Georgia.

There will be found in a great many instances, by properly relocating the main highway where a fine road can be established for a nominal sum, where to do the same results over the same old route, would bankrupt most any county.

I throw out these lines as food for thought and to be read over by the means of bringing about results not only through the counties through which the Dixie highway extends, but in each and every county throughout the entire state.

Vacation Schools.

The organization with a steadiness and evenness that shows it is no mere fad. Thirty years ago the first vacation school was opened in Newark. In 1893 the first vacation school was opened in New York, and in 1912, according to the federal bureau of education, in 148.

In Chicago it has been supported by Mrs. Ella Young. Claxton has backed it energetically, pronouncing it possible in this way to cover the work of the eight grammar-school years in six, and to arrange for the inclusion of many colleagues in the school who are not in regular attendance.

No more than one-fourth of all city school children, it is estimated, go away for the summer and have used the vacation period to give their minds a rest. The school is reduced to demoralizing idleness in streets and alleys, or on vacant lots. To the usual attendance of 90 hours, a large addition might be made without harm to pupil or teacher.

The summer school will undoubtedly test again the flexibility of the city's vacation school. It is needed only in certain sections, and it is well that it should be begun slowly enough to permit of experimentation. But the idea that there is anything essentially injurious to the child in the vacation school, as suggested by European experience, may be safely dismissed.

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"THE SWISS"

BERN, Switzerland.—Away up the street was the sound of military music. The march was being played. A short, choppy, snappy march which somewhat recalled the action of those having long legs.

Just babies, some of these cadets. Some of them could not have been more than twelve years of age. Their little legs straddled judiciously in the effort to keep step. Their little faces were portentously solemn. The youngest were but twelve years and could not look up. The oldest had not turned sixteen.

But, and here is the importance of the cadets to Switzerland—each of these kiddies carried a full-sized military rifle. A full-sized bayonet avuncle at each tender side. The point almost dragged on the ground sometimes, as though it were a sword dangling from a martyr's hand.

Membership is voluntary, of course. The Swiss youth is not required to take his military service until he is past nineteen years. But the little fellows are being drilled in a service to the state. Each boy in turn takes his turn at target practice—with real rifles and with the usual practice charges—and there are artillery companies in which these children have been drilled. By the time they are sixteen they are disciplined soldiers.

Switzerland is a militarism of which the aim is defense, and not aggression—is ever defensible, then Switzerland has shown the way. If foreigners be excluded, almost 100 per cent of Switzerland's population could be called into the army. The boys are drilled, armed and equipped to the last leather, would answer the call. One result of that national preparedness may be seen.

She is completely surrounded by belligerent nations. France and Germany and Austria surround her. To the south is Italy. Their various interests collide in and about her. She is a small, peaceful, and happy nation, a weak or a spineless nation she would have been at war or have been humiliated times without number.

"We had a dinner there," a Swiss officer told me, "and we were surprised to find that the English, the French officers and the Swiss officers were guests at the same table, and yet neither side stepped upon the other's territory."

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CROP DOCTORS

BY FREDERIC J. HARRIS

NOT long ago, word came to Washington from that section of Florida where fine tomatoes are raised, that a disease was spreading among them to their prime. Almost at the same time messages from Denver reported that carloads of tomatoes had arrived there rotted by this same pest.

In this emergency Uncle Sam's crop doctors were the men of the hour. In the United States agricultural department one hundred scientists who are trained to diagnose and cure the diseases of plants, exactly as a physician treats those of the human body, were called upon to study the mysterious ailment among the white pine forests of New England, means a hurry call, a hasty departure, prompt and skillful action, just as though human life were at stake.

Even a casual observer can hardly have failed to note that within the past few decades there has been a tremendous increase in plant disease. Almost weekly some new disease is reported, and the list of plant blights, a parasite upon some vegetable, fruit or flower, which threatens the profits of an industry and the support of a community, is growing longer and longer. In its native country a plant has struggled through long centuries with the pests and diseases which beset it, until sort of a truce has been reached between the two. The destructive power of the parasite to the plant has been checked, and the plant has reached a state of equilibrium.

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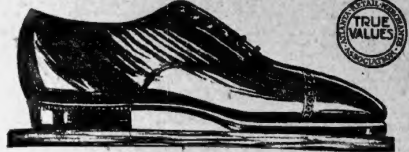

STUFFED SWEET GREEN PEPPERS: Make a stuffing with equal parts of the bread crumbs and uncooked ground beef, season with salt, pepper and onion juice.

MOCK WHIPPED CREAM: It is not always possible to get heavy cream and for a substitute beat the whites of two eggs stiff, add one-half cup of milk, one cup of confectioner's sugar, one teaspoon of vanilla and beat again until light. Serve at once.

COTTAGE PUDDING: Cream one rounding tablespoon of butter with one-half cup of sugar, add the beaten yolk of one egg, three-quarters cup of milk, a salt spoon of salt and one and one-half cups of flour sifted twice with two level teaspoons of baking powder. Fold in last the whites of the eggs beaten stiff. Bake in a shallow pan and cut in squares for serving or in a bread pan and cut in slices.

LEMON SAUCE: Mix two level tablespoons of corn starch with one cup of sugar and turn into two cups of boiling water. Cook ten minutes add the grated yellow rind and the juice of one lemon and a rounding tablespoon of butter. This rule ought to make the sauce the right consistency, but if the water evaporates fast in cooking add boiling water to make the original amount.

PLAIN COOKIES: Cream one-half cup of butter with one cup of sugar, add one beaten egg, one-half cup of milk and one-half teaspoon of vanilla. Sift one saltspoon of salt and two level teaspoons of baking powder into one cup of flour, add to the fat mixture and enough more flour to make a dough stiff enough to roll out. Roll a portion at a time one-eighth of an inch thick, cut in rounds and bake in a quick oven.

CATERPILLAR BREAD: Pour two cups of boiling water on one cup of rolled oats, let stand one hour, add one-half cup of molasses, one-quarter teaspoon of salt, one yeast cake dissolved in one-half cup of lukewarm water and

BRYAN INVEIGHS AGAINST MILITARY PREPAREDNESS

Declares Strong Armament Does Not Prevent but Causes War

By Associated Press.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Armed preparedness provokes rather than prevents war, and that the upheaval in Europe was a result of the false philosophy that "might makes right," former Secretary Bryan today, in a second of his series of three statements on "The Causeless War," submits an argument against military preparation by the United States and praises the course of President Wilson in the international emergency.

"If any nation is without excuse for entering into a mad rivalry with the belligerent nations in preparation for war it is the United States," says Mr. Bryan. "We are protected on either side by thousands of miles of ocean and this protection is worth more to us than any number of battleships.

"We have an additional protection in the fact, known to every one, that we have the men with whom to form an army of defense if we are ever attacked, and it is known also that we would have the money to buy more money than we would have had if all the surplus earnings of the people had been invested in armament. We not only do not need additional preparation, but we are fortunate in not having it, since it seems impossible for a nation to have what is called preparedness without laying along with it a disposition to use its preparedness on the slightest provocation.

"The leading participants in the present war are the nations that were best prepared, and I fear it would have been difficult for us to keep out of this war if we had been as well prepared as they."

"Happy for our nation that we have in the White House at this time a great man who believes in settling the world's good example, instead of following the bad example which it sets in this matter. What an unpardonable misfortune it would have been if, in such an hour as this, the nation had been under the leadership of a president inclined by the false philosophy which has plunged Europe into the abyss of war."

In discussing the cause of the European conflict, Mr. Bryan in a lengthy analysis argues that it is no war of religion or families, and that "if I correctly analyzed the situation, the war is the natural result of a false philosophy."

"The doctrine that 'might makes right' is the natural result of a false philosophy," Mr. Bryan says. "Leading up to his argument against preparation for war by the United States, Mr. Bryan says:

"We dare not trust the peace of the world to those who spend their time in getting ready for wars that should never come. Half the energy employed in preparing for war would be effectively wasted if it were used in propagating the principles which make for peace. Instead of preventing war, preparedness provokes war, because it is impossible to coerce the people into hearing the burdens incident to continuous and increasing preparation without cultivating hatred as if it were a natural virtue. There must be some one to fear; some other preparing nation that must be represented as plotting for war."

"How can preparedness prevent war if it prepares? Each step taken by one nation toward more complete preparedness excites the other nations to additional purchases of new levies, until all have exhausted their productive industry and menaced their moral progress."

"Concluding his masterful argument, Mr. Howard left the case in Governor Stanton's hands with the statement:

"In behalf of Leo Frank, his kindred and his friends, we as his counsel profess to you our profoundest thanks for the patience with which you have heard this plea. On behalf of the people in Georgia, who believe that in balance and in fairness, right can be established and enthroned over wrong, we thank you. And we all thank God, the maker of all that is good, for the presence of your excellency, sanctified a loyal, tutored mind and a courageous heart to perform his will in this case."

"You have been to us—in our assurance, that you possess these qualities, by the guidance, as we believe, of Divine Providence—the pillar of cloud by day and you have been to us the pillar of fire by night, for we have come to the very valley of the shadow of death in God's will, and in justice, in the laws of this great state to justify, in moderation, and in mercy, less our hope. I thank you."
