The advance guard of the Georgia legislature is in Atlanta in its special train. The lobby of the Kimball house is beginning to see the political discussion, while the posters hanging on the railing of the court proclaim headquarters for candidates and this and that project.

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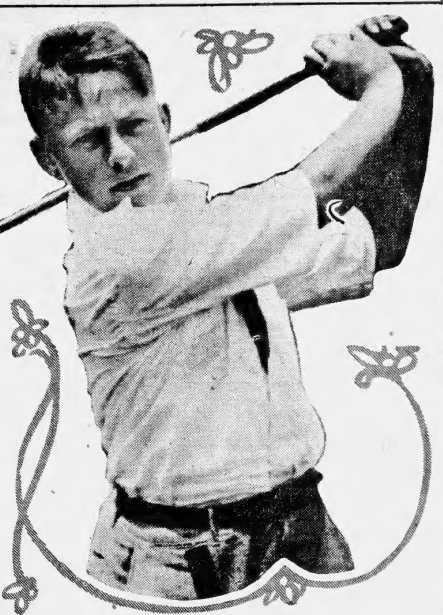

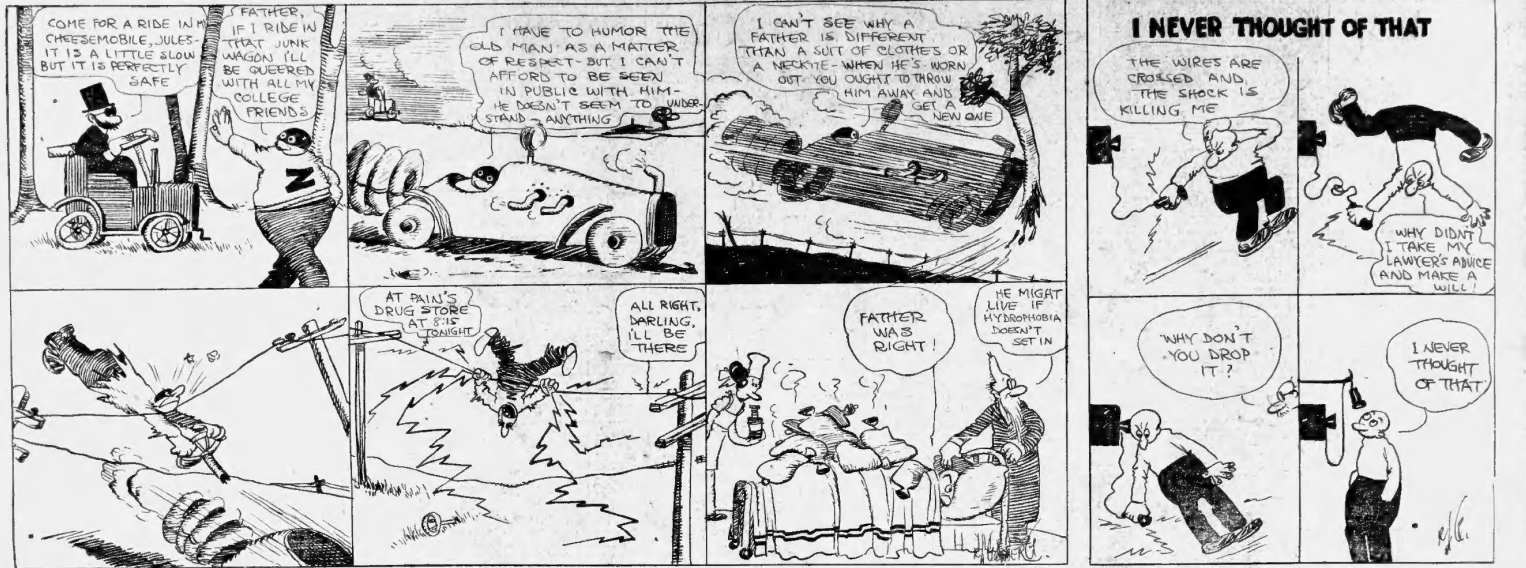
