

FRANK'S ASSAILANT IS READY TO TELL HARRIS WHOLE STORY

J. William Green Who Cut Fellow Prisoner's Throat Is Ready to Talk to State's Chief Executive Now

FRANK'S CONDITION IS STEADILY IMPROVING

Fever Drops Tuesday Noon

When Drops Is Opened and Pus Drained Out—Not Out of Danger Yet

(By Journal Staff Correspondent.)
MILLEDGEVILLE, Ga., July 20.—Leo M. Frank's assailant, J. William Green, today said he would be ready to tell his whole story to Governor Nathan Harris.

Attending physicians assert that Frank has gained several points in his battle for life.

Although his condition is admittedly very serious and none will venture to say that he is by any means out of danger, he will be able to tell his story, it is believed, before several days have passed.

Following the establishment of free drainage by the removal of the pus from the wound, Frank's condition has been slowly improving.

On Tuesday morning his temperature began to drop, jumping from 100 degrees to 98.5, and his pulse from 114 to 100.

On Tuesday afternoon, attending physician Dr. Guy D. Compton, Dr. Thomas M. Hall and Dr. R. J. Rosenberg, found small quantities of pus, which were attributed to Frank's temperature.

For a time this caused alarm, but within two hours the pus had disappeared and it is believed that the opening of the wound will speed his recovery.

FRANK CHEERFUL

On making a minute examination of the wound, the attending physician, Dr. J. W. Green, in his report on Frank Saturday night, had ascribed the external injury to the wound, and the wound, which he stated as deep as the carotid artery and the internal jugular, laying there, he said, was a serious one.

Physicians attending Frank at 9 o'clock this morning issued a statement saying Frank's temperature at that hour was 100; pulse 80, and respiration 20. Frank's condition was said to be improving and the following official bulletin at 10 a. m. was given out at Milledgeville.

"Frank's temperature at 10 a. m. today was 101.5 degrees; pulse 80; respiration 20. The temperature is believed to be due to a small quantity of pus in the wound. Three stitches were removed and free drainage established. His condition remains favorable."

At noon today Frank's condition was said to be improving. He was able to sit up and eat a small quantity of food. He was cheerful and hopeful at all times. He is well established in his quarters.

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Claims on Property Seized by Germany Filed by Americans

Millions of Dollars Are Involved by Seizures in Territory Now Held in Belgium and Northern France

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, July 20.—Official instructions to Americans who desire to present against German claims growing out of the requisition of property in Belgium, northern France and Poland have been sent out by the state department. Millions of dollars worth of property are understood to be affected.

The United States has been officially advised of the German government's creation of "the imperial indemnity commission" which claims for compensation for property requisitioned in enemy territory occupied by German military forces.

The rules of procedure require that the commission be organized in Germany and that documents submitted in any other language will be considered only when accompanied by certified German translation.

Numerous claims have already been presented and pressed for action by the department. They include a variety of articles of considerable value, but of a luxurious character, seized by the Germans in Belgium on the pretext of being needed for the army of occupation and then shipped back to Germany.

The department does not accept in principle the taking of property that does not come under the head of necessity.

CLAIMS BEING FILED

Claims of Americans are being filed by Ambassador Gerard with the German foreign office for presentation to the commission. The department will transmit to the ambassador papers in which claims with the understanding that the claimants personally or by attorney, after other necessary steps in connection with the presentation of the claims.

In transmitting claims the United States does not pass upon their propriety, equity or legality, which are left for final determination under international law in case it becomes necessary to formally present them as diplomatic claims.

The department has been informed also that the German government has taken steps to organize "board of arbitration" to consider "claims for the return of property." The German government's prompt action in filing of claims is suggested.

The imperial indemnity commission is composed of five members, embracing three jurists and two merchants. It may direct payment of "indemnity" award return of the goods instead of compensation. "How the German government will deal with the claims is not known. It is believed that the claims will be handled in a group and refused to discuss the situation.

The German submarine attack on the Cunarder Orduna was brought formally to the attention of the American government today by William O. Thompson, counsel for the industrial relations commission, who was a passenger on the ship.

Secretary Lansing took Mr. Thompson's statement and said that the attack on the Orduna was a serious matter and that the American government would take appropriate action.

MEAT PACKERS' CASE
RESUMED IN LONDON

Lard Seized Because Germans Make Glycerine Out of It, Is Stated

LONDON, July 20.—The hearing of the American meat packers case in prize court was resumed today.

Pointing out that immense quantities of lard are in the seized cargoes, Sir Frederick Smith, solicitor general, contended this was intended for war purposes. He said it would have been used to make glycerine.

The president of the court, Sir Samuel Evans, suggested lard was not absolute contraband. The solicitor general replied that lard was a recent discovery.

BRITISH TANK STEAMER
SEIZED BY U. S. OFFICER

Vessel Put to Sea With One Operator Instead of Two as Law Requires

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—The British steamer, the *Albatross*, was seized today by the United States inspectors after she had put to sea with only one wireless operator aboard instead of two as required.

Inspector Stone pursued and overtook the vessel in a coast guard cutter. He said that the *Albatross* had been warned yesterday that she must replace her wireless operator. The *Albatross* was seized for the violation of the law. The fine of \$500.

DRAFT OF MILSON'S REPORT TO GERMAN ENDORSED BY CABINET

Officials Silent on Contents of Note, Which Will Not Be Made Public Until It Is Received in Berlin

SITUATION COMPLICATED BY ATTACK ON ORDUNA

President Is Told by His Advisers That Public Sentiment Is in Favor of Taking Firm Stand

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, July 20.—President Wilson and the cabinet, after two hours' discussion today, approved a final draft of the note to Germany. Cabinet officials refused to discuss the contents of the note to Germany.

The note will be ready in a day or two for dispatch to Berlin. Some changes suggested in today's meeting will be incorporated, and after careful revision by Secretary Lansing it will be cabled to Ambassador Gerard.

There was no manifestation of tension in official quarters, confidence prevailing that in the absence of any new violation of American rights the situation would not become immediately dangerous. Some officials were impressed, however, that the attack on the British steamer Orduna, endangering American passengers had introduced a new set of circumstances, showing that even on voyages from Europe to the United States, submarine warfare was waged by Germany, subjects neutral to constant risk.

It is not certain, however, that any reference to the Orduna will be made in the new American note.

While the probable contents of the new communication are not known, it will reiterate the position taken by the United States in previous notes that the German government's recent actions are in violation of international law and that the American government will take appropriate action.

CITY CHEMIST PLANS TO BROUGHTON AND BRYAN CLASH ABOUT WAR

C. C. Hommon Believes He Can Save City Hundreds of Dollars

Pastor Tells of Heated Argument in Asheville in New York Herald Interview

C. C. Hommon, city chemist and bacteriologist, has discovered that the city has been allowing \$10,000 worth of valuable gas to escape each year from the sewage disposal plants and has already secured a patent for the use of gas at the Peachtree creek disposal plant, and is now asking council for authority to erect a plant, which will enable the city to utilize the by-product.

While no effort has ever been made before to utilize the gas escaping from similar plants, Mr. Hommon, a young man, is not dismayed by a lack of precedent, and declares that with the expenditure of \$350 for a small plant, he can save the city several hundred dollars each year.

Mr. Hommon, during last week, spread a trap over one of the six inlets at the sewage disposal plant and caught the escaping gas. He finds that gas containing 900 British Thermal units is generated by each tank at the rate of 30 cubic feet per hour. Mr. Hommon declares this gas is almost equal in quality to natural gas and is better than the ordinary gas sold here.

Muscovites Weakening at All Points, According to Reports From Most Every Point in Europe, Tuesday

WINDAU, IN COURLAND, WRESTED FROM CZAR

Italians Report Progress Against Austrians at Many Points on the Isonzo Front; French Airmen Make Raid

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, July 20.—The great German offensive in the east is seriously threatening Russian possession of Warsaw, and its execution must be far distant, in the opinion of many military observers. Both on the north and on the south, Teutonic pressure is being exerted with seemingly irresistible force, while in the center General von Ludendorff has ordered the Russian army to the defense of the city. Berlin even claims an advance to points within ten miles of Moscow.

The capture of 45,000 Russians is announced in Berlin.

The Austro-German army pressing on the Lublin-Chelm railroad line have captured Krasnostaw and are threatening an exciting movement.

Windau, in Courland, has been captured by the Germans advancing toward Riga. This movement in the Baltic sea to Lithuania are closing the lines to the south still more insecure.

News And Comment In General Assembly

GRITTY BOARD OF TRADE AGAINST PERSONS' TAX BILL

Members of the legislature have received copies of a resolution adopted by the board of trade opposing the passage of the persons' tax amendment bill now before the general assembly.

The resolution reads as follows:

"Resolved, By the board of trade, that the board of trade of the city of Atlanta, in its annual meeting assembled:

First, We regard as exceedingly ill-considered the amendment to the state tax law, now pending in the Georgia legislature, and known as the Persons' bill. We believe the injurious effect of such a law would greatly outweigh any possible benefit to be derived by the state through its enactment, even though it might produce an increased income.

"Second, That we respectfully request and urge our representatives in the house and senate to earnestly and actively oppose the passage of this bill."

SENATOR BOYKIN HAS THIRTY-THREE BILLS.

Senator Boykin, of the Seventeenth, has a rather unique plan for revising and improving the methods of keeping books in the offices of the various courts, keeping records of cases and transfers and increasing the efficiency of the court's recording system and the land title and personality title system generally.

Instead of introducing one voluminous bill, which would cover all of the changes which he wishes to make, and which, if it ever were read and digested by the senators, might lead to past largely because of its size and complexity, Senator Boykin has drawn up thirty-three bills, each taking up a portion of the reforms he is seeking.

Prior to Monday he had introduced

two of these bills; Monday he introduced eight of them, and he has more to come.

The senator's idea in doing this is that it would be better to pass some of these bills and get some of the reforms started at once, rather than try to force all of the provisions through in one bill.

BRANNON AND RICE HAVE BIG BUNCH OF PATIENCE.

L. G. Brannon, chief clerk of the Georgia senate, and Charles F. Rice, calendar clerk, have a hard row of stumps to hoe.

Mr. Brannon is supposed to take charge of all bills introduced and passed and up for second readings as soon as they are read, so that he can record them upon the minutes of the senate. The bills are thrown down by Assistant Secretary Hensell to a little ledge above Mr. Brannon's desk. He reaches up to the ledge and pulls down bills by the handful—sometimes. Often his hand grasps the empty air.

"Thank life up to him to look around to the press table, where, more than likely, he will find his batch of bills being copied assiduously by three busy newspaper men who think more of informing the great Georgia public than the keeping of the senate's minutes. Or else, Mr. Brannon will find several of the bills in the hands of senators, who, having passed them, are reading them over to see what they provide. But Mr. Brannon is good-natured, and long service in the senate has added to his bump of patience. So he gets his minutes fixed up in shorthand somehow or other, in spite of the interference.

Charles F. Rice, sitting to the left of the president's desk, with the senate calendar before him, has just about the

same worrisome time of it. If one of the newspaper men overlooks a bill on Mr. Brannon's desk he hikes over to Mr. Rice's desk and finds it there—perhaps just at the instant that Mr. Rice is about to inscribe it upon the permanent records of the senate. Then in addition to this, there are one or two pages who delight in turning on the electric fan which rests three feet from Mr. Rice's ear. Mr. Rice doesn't like the fan at all, anyway, and when it blows four or five bills from his desk to the floor, as it often does, he is fuming for it. Verily, working in the senate is no soothing bed of roses.

AGE OF ALL FEMALES REQUIRED BY NEW BILL.

Parents or guardians are required to register with the county ordinary the name and age of their unmarried females, under the terms of a bill introduced in the house Monday by Representative Johnston, of Appling county.

The purpose of the author is not to make the young ladies and old maids of the state by making public their age, but to prevent the issuance of marriage licenses for families below the marriageable age.

As the law now stands, a fellow can go to the ordinary's office and represent his sweetheart's age as he pleases and obtain a license to marry her.

Often the sweetheart is a mere child, but the law makes no provision whereby the ordinary can ascertain this fact before issuing the license.

Hence the bill by Mr. Johnston.

The state prison commission decided late Monday afternoon to make an investigation of the attempt of J. W. Green to kill Leo M. Frank at the state prison farm at Milledgeville. The commission, accompanied by Governor Harris, will go to the farm Saturday and will make a full and complete inquiry.

They will undertake to find out whether or not Green made the attack on his own motion or whether he was prompted to it by anyone in the prison; whether Green had access to any arms; whether he was in the kitchen at the time of the attack; how Green got hold of the knife with which he cut Frank's throat; and how he managed to conceal it; how Green came to be allowed to leave his cell in the dormitory; and all other facts surrounding the attack.

The decision by the commission to make an investigation was reached after the penitentiary committee of the house of representatives, meeting in the prison farm at Milledgeville, members of the commission present, decided there was no occasion for an investigation.

Two resolutions calling for an investigation were introduced in the house Monday and were referred to the penitentiary committee. Representative John Dorsey, of Cobb county, chairman of the committee, called a meeting Monday afternoon to act on these resolutions.

The first, introduced by Representative Starke, of Jackson county, called for an investigation of "the attempt to be a negligent use of butcher knives" at the state farm. This resolution was tabled by the committee.

The second, introduced by Representative Smith, of DeKalb county, directed the commission to investigate "all the facts surrounding the attack on Frank" and report to the house and senate. This resolution was likewise tabled by the committee.

Then Representative Campbell, of Newton county, made a motion for the appointment of a sub-committee from the penitentiary committee to investigate and report back to the committee of the whole. This motion the committee voted down.

After the committee had taken these three actions, R. E. Davidson, chairman of the prison commission, stated to the committee that the commission considered it a crazy man; that there was no hog killing at the prison farm Saturday; that Green worked in the kitchen and must have got the knife there; that there was no way for the guards to detect him taking the knife, and that the commission could see no particular need of an investigation.

Later the commission held a meeting and decided, as said above, that an investigation should be made. The penitentiary committee of the house, after disposing of the F. M. case, went in joint session with the penitentiary committee of the senate for the purpose of completing the report of an investigation of sanitary conditions at the state prison farm, which the two committees made jointly last week.

In the course of the discussion there were several lively fights between members of the committee and R. E. Davidson, chairman of the prison commission, who was present. Mr. Davidson claimed that some members of the committee seemed bent on blaming the commission for unsanitary conditions at the farm, and he strenuously objected, on the ground that the commission has repeatedly called the legislature's attention to the lack of sanitary facilities, and urged an appropriation to install the same, without result. Therefore, he contended that the prison commission should not be held responsible.

Following is the report given out by the committee and submitted to the house Tuesday evening by Chairman John W. Dorsey:

Mr. Speaker: Your committee on penitentiary and prison affairs has had the honor to receive from the state farm at Milledgeville, this state, the following report:

(1) We find that the water supply, which is the most important, is well and clean, and is supplied to the inmates of the farm, and is used for drinking purposes, but is not filtered, and is not pure.

(2) We find the farm buildings without sewerage, with the exception of the dormitory and the kitchen, and the water supply is in a bad condition, containing 30 inmates, the building is in a bad condition, and is not suitable for the purpose of the farm.

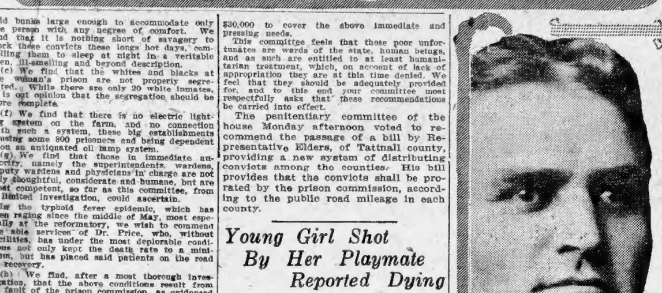
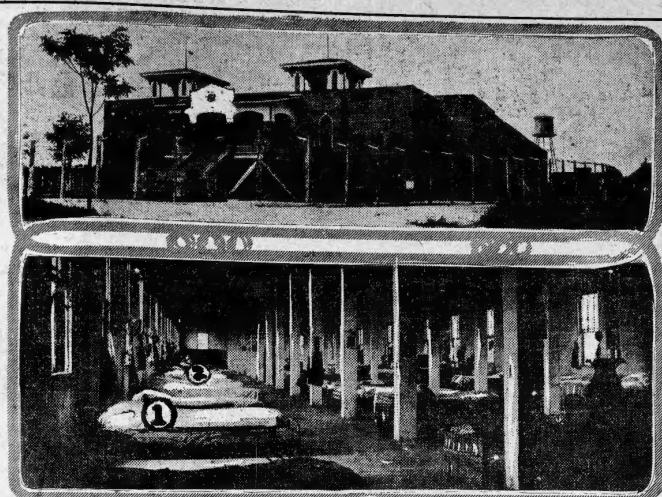
