

WORK ON EMORY CAMPUS PROGRESSING RAPIDLY

Four New Buildings to Be
Erected Within Year—New
Dormitory Rented

Work is under way on the campus of Emory university in Druid Hills and the chancellor, Bishop Warren A. Chandler, announced Friday that four new buildings will be erected within the next twelve months. The building formerly occupied by the University club on Peachtree street near the governor's mansion, has been rented by the university to be used as a dormitory to accommodate the increased enrollment in the Chandler School of Theology. In speaking of the university's plans for catalogues and other information, Chandler said Friday:

"An unusual number of requests have come from every part of the country. In the student body there will be young men from every southern state, and some from as far west as California. It is known that two Korean students will attend Emory college, the school of liberal arts of the university, at Oxford. Another Korean will enter the school of medicine in Atlanta.

"NEW BUILDING RENTED.
"Already such an increased attendance in the school of theology is assured that it has been necessary to rent another dormitory to accommodate all who are coming. The large building formerly occupied by the University club, located near the governor's mansion on Peachtree street, has been leased for this purpose.

"Work has been begun on the campus in Druid Hills and four new buildings will be erected during the next twelve months. It is hoped that the school of law can be opened in the fall of 1916, and this will certainly be done, if funds sufficient can be secured to complete the building in time.

"GIFTS TO UNIVERSITY.
"A distinguished lawyer in Tennessee has sent the chancellor of the university \$1,000—as the initial contribution for the law school of the building for 'The Law School of Law.' An unknown friend in Missouri has sent \$1,000 as a loan to aid young preachers. Prof. H. W. Arant, who has been the assistant of the president of the Federal Convention, which framed our national constitution. This is the first contribution to the work of the university as rapid as the nature and magnitude of the enterprise will permit."

"A minister in North Carolina has written offering his library as a gift to the school of theology and another minister in Alabama makes the gift of a collection of standard works on all scientific subjects. The libraries of the schools of the university are growing rapidly. From time to time the work of the university is as rapid as the nature and magnitude of the enterprise will permit."

APPEALS TO DOCTORS TO AID IN DRUG CAMPAIGN

Victims Should Have Help During
Enforcement of Law,
Declares Alexander

Hooper Alexander, United States district attorney, has called on the doctors of Atlanta to co-operate with the government and arrange some means by which drug funds, many of whom are in a pitiable condition as a result of the enforcement of the anti-narcotic act, may be given treatment.

With this in view, Mr. Alexander will on Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock confer with Dr. Stewart Roberts, president of the Fulton County Medical Association. A. O. Blalock, internal revenue collector, and D. J. Gantt, the revenue agent here.

"Mr. Alexander said that if the city would employ a physician to stay on duty at Grady hospital and administer decreasing doses of drugs to addicts, thus enabling them to shake off the habit without suffering, that by Christ-mas there would not be a drug fiend left in Atlanta.

"I am convinced that the enforcement of the law is creating many hardships among drug fiends," Mr. Alexander said Saturday. "Some of the cases that have come under my observation are distressing.

"I have just seen three young fellows who are addicted to drugs. They tell me that they got into the habit by the time they were out of short trousers. They now want to quit, and are willing to do anything possible to do so.

"If I can get the doctors and druggists to co-operate, and I know I can, we can break up the illegal drug traffic in this city by Christmas. This department will see to it that the abusers who make money out of the business are handled.

"I think that it can safely say that the drug traffic in Atlanta during the past week has been reduced fully half. The men who have been handling the traffic have been frightened off pretty well.

"My object in conferring with Mr. Roberts is to see whether some means cannot be devised by which drug fiends can be treated and taken care of until they are cured. My idea is that the city should employ a doctor to stay at the Grady hospital and prescribe proper amounts of drugs to victims until, through the tapering off process, they are fully cured.

BLUE RIDGE SOLICITOR WILL PROBE LYNCHING

Herbert Clay Tells Governor
Special Grand Jury Invest-
igation Will Be Made

Herbert Clay, of Marietta, solicitor general of the Blue Ridge circuit, which circuit includes Cobb county, called on Governor Harris Saturday morning and assured the governor that he would exert every effort within his power to protect the members of the mob that lynched Leo M. Frank, and to bring them to justice.

Solicitor Clay further informed the governor that Judge H. L. Patterson, the presiding judge of the Blue Ridge circuit, has called a special term of the superior court in Cobb county on the last Monday in August for the purpose of directing a special grand jury investigation of the lynching.

Governor Harris was very much gratified over the promptness of Solicitor Clay in coming to Atlanta to confer with him in regard to the lynching, and with the solicitor's evident sincerity in desiring to leave no stone unturned to punish the men who took the law into their own hands.

The governor expects the judge and solicitor to discover the identity of the men who perpetrated the shocking outrage upon the state and to punish them as the law provides.

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**Sale of Lynching
Pictures Prohibited**

The sale of photographs showing the body of Leo M. Frank hanging to a tree near Marietta was ordered stopped Saturday by the city council.

The ordinance which was introduced by Councilman J. N. Renfro and Alderman J. Lee Barnes passed both council and the aldermanic board without a dissenting voice. It was then signed by Acting Mayor I. W. Ransdell, and the police department was instructed to immediately stop the sale of the pictures.

The ordinance provides that "it shall be unlawful to sell or to offer for sale any picture or representation of any person's body hanging from a tree or other support, where the person has been killed by means of a mob or in other illegal manner."

"The measure provides the usual penalty of \$500 or thirty days in the city prison for its violation. It also provides the amount of the license fee by any one to sell such pictures shall be refunded and that no such license shall be issued until the measure is passed.

City Clerk Walter C. Taylor stated to the aldermanic board that only three licenses to sell the Frank pictures have been issued, as he refused to issue additional ones when he learned the nature of the pictures.

BRITISHERS NOT COMING TO ASK FOR A LOAN

Delegation to Rectify Adverse
Exchange Rate, Says
London Times

LONDON, Aug. 21.—It would be an error to suppose the British financial delegation is going to America to negotiate a loan, says the Times. "The primary business will be to rectify the adverse exchange rate and in the first instance other methods probably will be resorted to in concert with American bankers."

The policy discussed between Great Britain and her allies will be based on the power to send gold to the United States in such quantities as will assure the result aimed at, but it is possible the prospects of an American loan may be found sufficiently attractive for that course to be adopted.

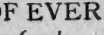

It would avoid the unfortunate development of jealousy between the countries of South and Central America. It would

an appreciated recognition of the sovereignty of Mexico. It would be a guaranty to Mexico and to all the other American countries that the United States, in engaging in this war, was not setting out on a career of conquest and annexation. Such an assurance will go far to establish real friendship relations between the United States and all the other American republics, and ought to be useful in the development of the hemisphere.

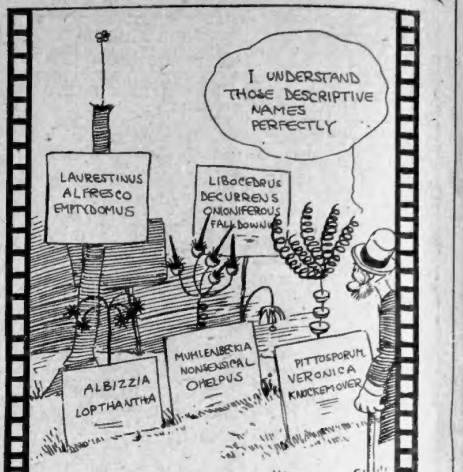
