TURK GUNS SILENCE POSITION OF ALLIES But Berlin Admits "Partial Stop" on Stripa River and French Continue to Hammer German Trenches

BERLIN, Aug. 31.—(By Associated Press.)—The British employed their attack on Turkish positions on the Gallipoli peninsula last Saturday and Sunday, according to a dispatch from Constantinople to the Frankfurter Zeitung, and the results were extremely heavy.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—(By Associated Press.)—A German report from the Grodno-Vidna front in Poland is indicated in a dispatch from Berlin that they are moving toward the stronghold from the east and south as well as from the north.

Constantinople reports the destruction by the allies near Seddul-Bahr on the Gallipoli peninsula. The French artillery is successfully continuing its work of inflicting damage upon German trenches, shelters and communication lines along the front, the Paris war office reports.

It is believed that the Austro-German forces are reported to have begun a large building in Ghent, Belgium, used by the Germans for building of submarines.

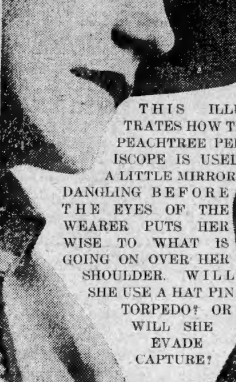

OVER-NIGHT BREAK IN FOREIGN EXCHANGE RATES

Slump in New Orders Expected Unless Rates are Rectified Soon

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—Foreign exchange rates reached their most serious stage today with an overnight break of two and one-half cents in sterling, the leading pound selling in this market at \$154.12, close to the mark where curtailment of big foreign orders to the United States would follow, in the opinion of bankers here.

Nothing like the violent break in quotations has ever been recorded in foreign exchange markets here before. The dollar level reached today was one and one-half cents below the mark set weeks ago by financiers as the so-called level of equilibrium which, when reached, would cause British buyers to stop or curtail their orders in place of their orders for such imports as could be obtained elsewhere than in America.

Foodstuffs, manufactured goods and machinery products, in fact, almost everything except actual munitions of war were embraced within this category.

Demoralization in the foreign exchange markets was indicated by almost chaotic conditions as the result of the break. There is no other world market of importance open, it was pointed out, but the world economy at home in all respects is being maintained by the sale of such commodities and purchases from such sources as are available here.

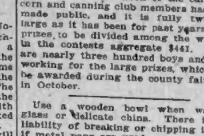

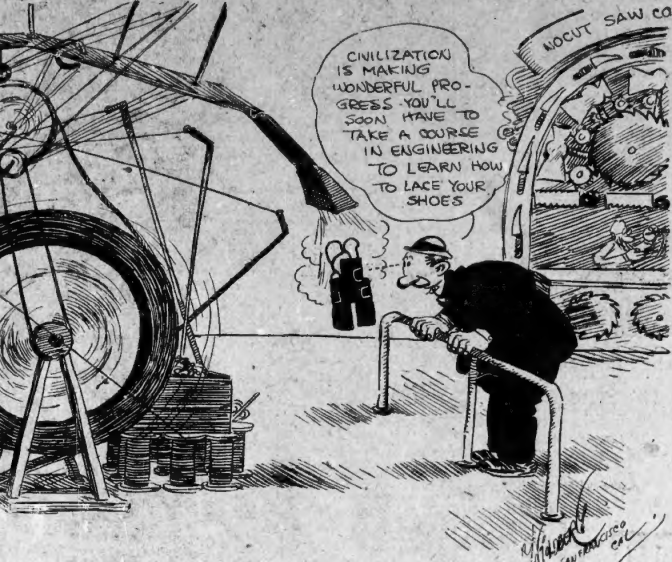
