Frank Trajourned Until Monday Morning With Solicitor Hugh Dorsey in Midst of Impassioned Speech

HE WILL CHARGE JURY IN FRANK CASE

LOCAL BANKS WILL GET ABOUT \$750,000 FROM GOVERNMENT

Exact Figures Not Obtainable, but Are Close to Actual Amount—Whole State Will Receive Around \$1,800,000

MACON; AUGUSTA AND SAVANNAH BANKS' SHARE

Estimated That Macon Will Get \$500,000, and Others \$250,000 Each—Funds Will Arrive in About a Week

(By Ralph Smith.)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—A million and a half hundred thousand dollars is to be distributed to the banks of Georgia to facilitate the movement of the cotton crop. The money will be distributed among the cities of Savannah, Atlanta, Macon and Augusta on a basis of national banking capital.
It is believed that upwards of \$750,000 will be deposited in the banks of Atlanta, but the exact figures are not known definitely.
A formal statement will be issued Monday by the assistant secretary of the United States treasury department to facilitate the movement of the cotton crop. The money will be distributed among the cities of Savannah, Atlanta, Macon and Augusta on a basis of national banking capital.
The facts in the above dispatch are approximately correct. Atlanta banks will receive approximately \$500,000, Macon and Augusta about \$250,000 each, and Savannah about \$250,000. The funds will arrive in about a week.
The local banks will receive the money in a week or ten days. It is expected that much time to arrange all the necessary details. The money will be sent this time, and the balance remaining in quarterly payments, beginning December 1, and ending March 1.
It is not possible to learn how the total amount will be prorated among the banks of the state. It is probable that Macon will receive about \$500,000 each, and Savannah and Augusta combined can be expected to receive about \$500,000 each. The fact that Macon has more than any other national banks in Georgia, however, is not authoritative but is fairly safe estimate.
The local clearing house has received orders from the treasury department outlining the various conditions of the necessary advance, most of which are already familiar.

Probability That Mexico Will Bow Head to Uncle Sam's Attitude on Account of Foreign Governments

PRESIDENT MAY POSTPONE READING SPECIAL MESSAGE

Wilson's Insistence on Original Proposals Shows Mexico Futility of Sending Envoy to States

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Foreign governments, some of which have recognized the Huerta government in Mexico, are exerting much pressure upon the United States to yield to the demands of the United States. President Wilson may cause the matter to be postponed until the reading of his message to congress on Tuesday.
Administration officials here today view today's dispatches from John Lind, the newly appointed minister to Mexico, as a result of the news debate held Thursday in which President Wilson was almost unanimously endorsed in his efforts to bring about peace.
The original proposition had had the effect of contracting to Mexico the offer of sending a mission to Mexico to discuss the situation with President Wilson. The United States has informed Huerta that unless the envoy brought a favorable answer to the American note his mission would be fruitless. No envoy is now expected, but the note is still being expected to bring about important developments.
President Wilson meanwhile probably completed his message to congress and read it over to secretary Bryan today.
Direct action from Mexico City that President Wilson's Huerta might wish to receive the recognition of the American government before President Wilson revealed the negotiations to the world, have changed the situation and today's prospects are more contingent upon the moves of the next few hours.
Mr. Wilson interrupted work on his message long enough today to get a few hours of rest at the White House.

MRS. COLEMAN'S AND FRANK'S LIFE COMES UP IN MRS. COLEMAN'S SPEECH

Solicitor Was Nearing End of Masterly Address When the Court Ordered a Recess Until Monday Morning—At That Time the Solicitor Will Conclude, the Judge Will Deliver His Charge and the Case Will Go to Jury for Decision

FRANK'S TIME ALIBI ATTACKED BY SOLICITOR THROUGH FRANK'S OWN STATEMENT TO POLICE

Dorsey Declares Frank First Told Police He Did Not Leave Factory Until 1:10 and That He Could Not Have Been Seen on Whitehall at That Hour—Case of Defense Assailed at Every Point—Here Is Speech in Full

So eloquent did Solicitor Dorsey become in his argument Saturday afternoon that Mrs. J. W. Coleman, mother of Mary Phagan, the little girl for whose murder Leo M. Frank is on trial, became hysterical and uttered several piercing cries, interrupting the solicitor's argument for several minutes.
The plainly apparent anguish of Mrs. Coleman had its effect upon Frank's mother and wife, and they covered their faces with their hands, while endeavoring to quiet the distracted and weeping mother.
Mrs. Coleman was overcome with emotion when Solicitor Dorsey, pointing his finger at the defendant, declared that Mary Phagan had sacrificed her life to protect her honor. Mr. Dorsey spoke with tenderness of the little girl, but he bitterly arraigned Frank, pointing him out as the man whose evil passions had driven him to commit a heinous murder.
Court adjourned at 1:40 until 9 o'clock Monday morning. Mr. Dorsey had concluded his argument although he had spoken for six hours and ten minutes.
Solicitor Dorsey's speech was a masterly presentation of the state's case. It was an unusually eloquent effort, but not characterized so much by oratory as it was by a logical analysis of the evidence.
Said by section the solicitor that the statements made by the defendant and section by section he pointed out flaws. His attack on this statement was a most exhaustive one. He has, so far, dwelt on no portion of Jim Conley's testimony, that is, except the portion which he has assailed. And in getting this corroborated the solicitor used the testimony of many of the witnesses for the defense as well as the defendant's own statements.
The solicitor's speech made a great impression upon the spectators in the court room and when court adjourned he stood for some time on the street in front of the court house cheered him as he left the building.
Taking up the charge of the debate that perjury had figured largely in the evidence of the state Solicitor Dorsey cited, one after another, the name and testimony of witnesses for the defense, and attacked the truth of their evidence. He also called the attention of the jury to the fact that many of the defense witnesses—employees of the pencil factory—had been given raises in their pay since the murder of Mary Phagan.
"And the raises did not stop at the 'pencil factory,'" said he, "Minola McKnight, cook at Frank's home, also got a raise."
Two of the witnesses for the defense—Mrs. Carson and Mrs. Small—declared Mr. Dorsey had corroborated Jim Conley's statement to the effect that he and Frank were on the fourth floor of the factory on Monday after the murder. Conley swore in his affidavit to the police, that he met Frank on the fourth floor and five later, while passing him had whispered to him and told him to "be a good boy."
A vigorous and detailed attack was made by Solicitor Dorsey upon the time chart alibi, offered by the attorneys for Leo M. Frank, and upon which they are largely depending to establish his innocence of the murder of Mary Phagan.
Mr. Dorsey contrasted this time chart with affidavits made by Frank and other witnesses as to the time certain incidents occurred on the morning of the murder. He called attention to the fact that the time chart says Frank left the factory to go to lunch at 1 o'clock, but that in his affidavit to the detectives Frank says he left the factory at 12:10.
"This chart," said Mr. Dorsey, "states that Mary Phagan arrived at the factory at 12:12, when Frank has asked that she came ten or fifteen minutes later. Mrs. Freeman and Mrs. Conley, who were present, says Lemmie Quinn came to the factory between 12:20 and 12:22, but the testimony of Mrs. Freeman and Miss Hall indicate he arrived before 12.
"Satisfied," declared Mann and Ivey say Frank arrived at the factory Saturday morning at 8:25. Frank himself says 8:30 and Jim Conley says 8:30."
Mr. Dorsey showed that Frank had called Frank Bell at 10 o'clock, that in his statement Frank swore he was at Montag's at 10. Mattie Smith says she left the factory on her first visit to the factory while Frank was in the factory on Monday.
Mr. Dorsey reminded the jury that the defense produced Miss Curran, daughter of an employe of Montag Bros., who swears she saw Frank at the corner of Alabama and Whitehall streets, at 1:10. "How could that be," asked Mr. Dorsey, "if Frank didn't leave the factory until 1:10, the hour he himself says he left."
Before taking up the time chart alibi Mr. Dorsey cited many cases to the jury where men of presumably good character had committed heinous crimes. Among them were Abe Ruef, of San Francisco; Oscar Wilde, Benedict Arnold; Mayor McGuire of Charlottesville, Va.; Frazer Richardson, of Boston; and Henry Clay Beattie, of Richmond.
At 5:45 o'clock, Saturday, expected to be the final day of the Frank trial outside of the jury room, the first man took his station facing the closed doors of the court room and began his wait.
Half an hour later thirty men were waiting in the line behind him.
At 8:45 o'clock, when the doors were opened, the line numbered hundreds of men, women and children.
More women attended the trial than at any previous session. The majority of these were given right of way into the court room when the doors were opened and the court officers took their stations to admit the jury.
One person at a time.
When Solicitor Dorsey said:
"May it please your honor and gentlemen of the jury, I had just about completed the matter of character when he adjourned yesterday. And I think I had demonstrated to the satisfaction of any fair-minded man that this defendant has not a good character."
"The conduct of counsel, as I have stated, is so falling to cross-examine, that I believe, in refusing to cross-examine—these twenty ladies who are not now in the court room, and absolutely the claim of this defendant that he has a good character."
"If this man had had a good character, no jury would have been called, and his counsel from asking Leo young ladies who they got their information, and why it was that he said that this man had a good character."
DARED NOT CROSS-EXAMINE.

PLEADS GUILTY UNDER COURT'S REBUKE OF JURY

After Judge Sent Jurors for Mistrial, Defendant Voluntarily Admitted Guilt

(Special Dispatch to the Journal.) MONTGOMERY, Ala., Aug. 22.—One of the most startling rebukes of a jury ever heard in the south was given by Federal Judge William B. 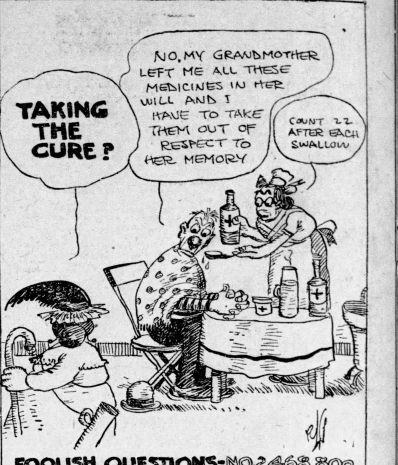
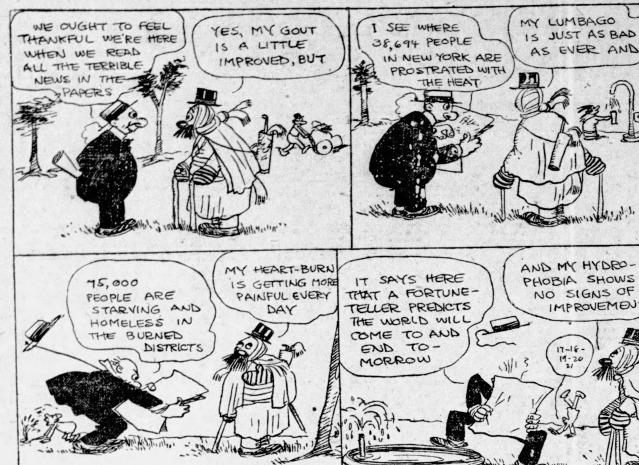
