2,500 HOMELESS SPEND NIGHT IN LIGHT OF FLAMES

Governor Leads Work of Providing Food and Shelter for Hundreds of Sufferers in Flame-Scarred City

FEAR WINDS MAY FAN EMBERS INTO FLAMES Volunteer Firemen Work Tirelessly to Blacken Smoking Ruins-City of Hot Springs Left Devastated

By Associated Press. HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Sept. 6.—Stunned by the extent of the damage wrought by last night's fire, when between five and fifty-five city blocks were swept by the flames, a loss estimated in the neighborhood of \$5,000,000, the people of Hot Springs today took the first steps toward rehabilitation.

Mayor McClellan accepted Governor Hays' offer of two companies of state militia and ordered a mass meeting for citizens for later in the day when it will be decided whether the city will ask outside cities for help.

It is estimated about 2,500 persons were made homeless by the blaze. The majority of these are being temporarily camped in the vicinity of the Oklahoma track and state fair grounds.

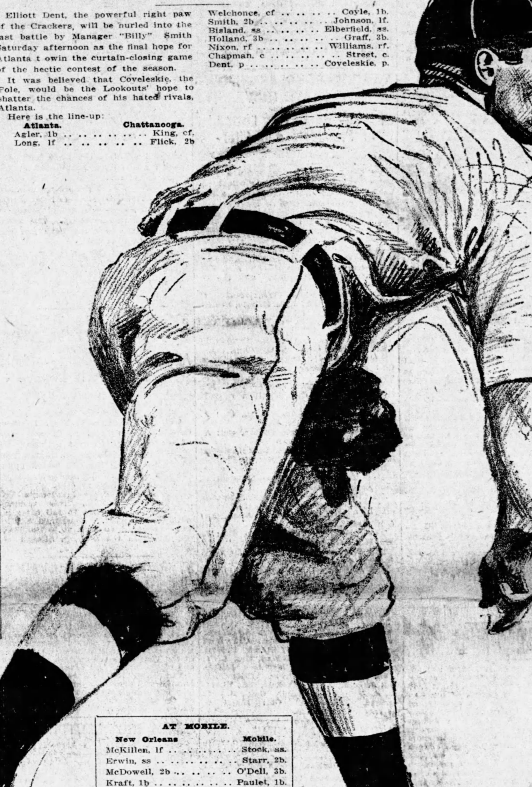
Count Okuma Urges Seizure of a Chinese Port and Fight on Anti-Jap Fever

When "My Maryland" Was First Sung

Even now, writing of it after so many many years, I seem to feel again the pulse of that thrilling time.

And it was here that there came intimately into my life one of the strongest influences of the national patriotism of my country. My father, a young man, and only brother, she, with her younger sister, Jimmie, had taken the lead in the secessionist movement among the young folks in Baltimore, who, having seen all their best men march across the border to enlist with the Confederates for the war, related their strained feelings by ever resentment of the Union officers and troops placed in possession of the city.

It was Jennie Cary who set the Maryland strain, "Maryland," to the air of "Lauriger Horatius" (brought to her by Burton Harrison when a student at Yale college), and first sang it with a chorus of her friends in a drawing room in Baltimore. She told me that she refrains, as originally printed in the copy of the paper, from the words "My Maryland" was sung only by young Confederate sympathizers in a city occupied by their enemy and under a strict martial rule, was to drift over the border, and be caught eagerly by the troops of the Maryland line, and to echo down the years as the most famous song of the Confederacy, it is fitting that to Miss Jennie Cary should be awarded all the honors of the day. We both sang it amid a little group of visitors in September, 1861, standing in the doorway of the Camden Street Hotel, in the town of the Maryland line facing us in the dusk of evening.

This was in answer to the request sent in from the soldiers of the friend, Captain Stewart, that they might hear a woman's voice again. "I can hear now the swing of that grand chorus as the men gradually caught up the ball and each one of us sang it day after day, to our joy and pride, the whole camp at Manassas was singing 'My Maryland.'"—From Mrs. Burton Harrison's "Recollections, Grave and Gay."

Caring for a Caged Bird

The first requisite in the care of any caged bird is cleanliness, the floor of the cage being so arranged that it may be easily cleaned and strewn with coarse sand. Light, sun and freedom from light or exposure in cold weather are all necessary. Fresh water, hot for drinking and bathing, should be given daily. For mixtures of seed, which usually include summer seed, expert care is needed, and the birds must also have soft-stuff, groundrod or water cross, which should always be available. The birds should be given them in winter a slice of apple is appreciated. When seeds only, especially an excess of the richer seeds such as sunflower and hemp, are given, the birds occasionally, in the winter, a little bread soaked in milk and then pressed dry may be given; this is much preferred food of a bird whose voice is lost after molting. It is necessary that a canary should never be frightened by loud noises, rough handling or sudden jarring of the cage; they are sensitive, affectionate little creatures, and a shock of any kind may cause illness or even death.—Rural New Yorker.

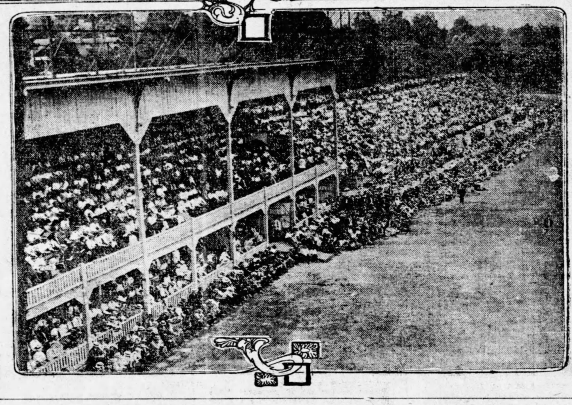

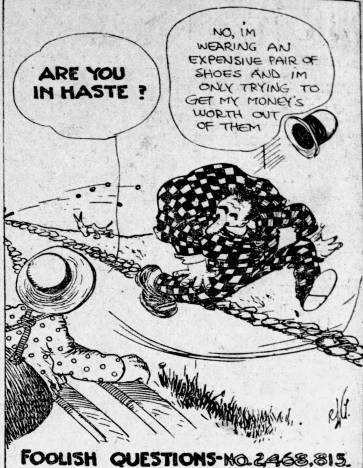
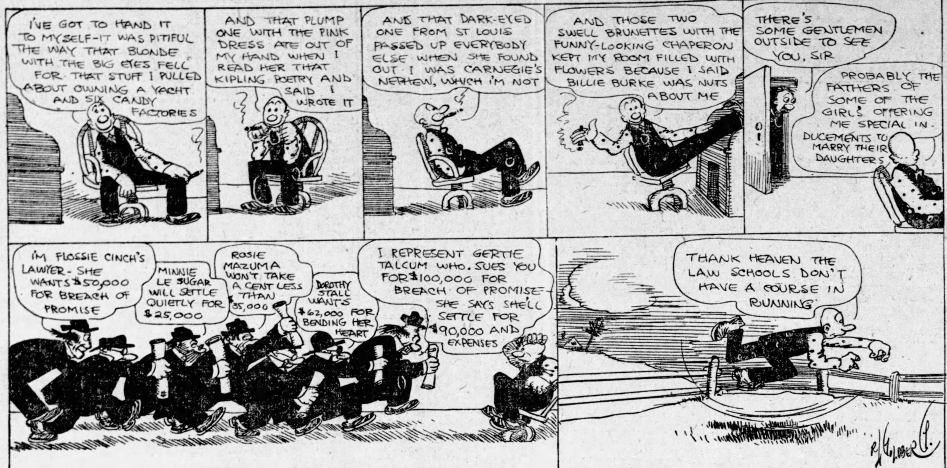
