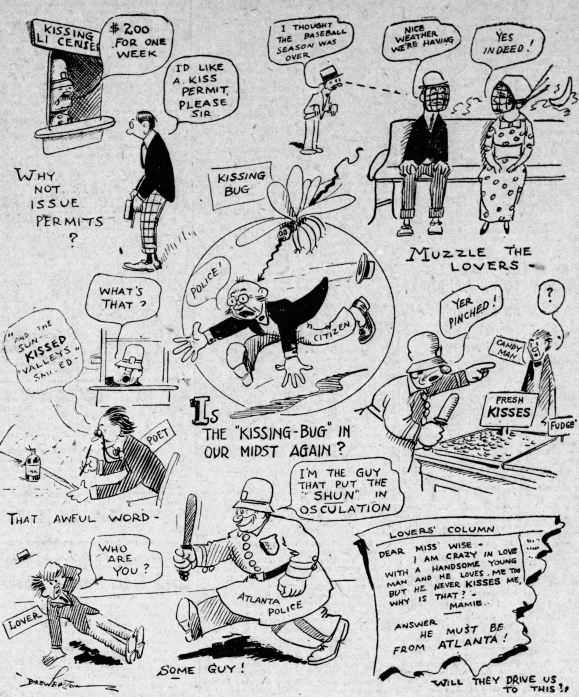

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DIO ESKMOES KILL ARCTIC EXPLORER?

Report, if True, Will Be First Instance of Savagery in that Tribe Known Of

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—Members of the Arctic club here are surprised at the report of the murder of H. V. Bradford, of New York, and George Street, of Ottawa, by Eskimos at Shulls Lake, near the Arctic ocean.

Ottawa dispatches report that Commissioner Perry in Regina has received information of the murder of the two explorers about June 5, 1912, while they were en route to Fort McPherson, but since Eskimo adventures are usually reported with caution, members of the Canadian mounted police have been sent to investigate.

Details of the alleged murder received by mail say that Bradford and Street in the fall of 1911 left Cheslerfield, the most northerly Hudson bay post, to go inland to meet with the Eskimos at Shulls Lake.

On the arrival there they arranged to remain with the tribe, but Bradford got into an altercation with a white man who appeared him to death. Street, seeing the Eskimo's assistance, was rescued from behind.

Bradford, a fellow of the American Geological society and member of the Arctic club of New York, left this city on February 12, 1910, for a four year trip of exploration in northern Canada. He planned to cover about 6,000 miles, exploring northwestern British Columbia, northern Alaska and the East Cape of Greenland.

On his return by telegraph news of the death of the two explorers were given at a newspaper office here yesterday a letter written by Bradford on June 5, 1912, the day he is supposed to have been killed. The letter was forwarded from Barabur Inlet by the same Eskimo chief named Ahlahah, who brought the news of the alleged murder of the two white men to the northwest mounted police.

In his letter Bradford told of the rescue of the Eskimos and announced that he and Street were starting for the Melville delta. He said he believed that he and Street were the only white men who had entered the East Cape of Greenland's expedition of 1821.

Bradford said that he and Street hoped to complete his inspection and mapping of the coast of the East Cape, remaining unexplored, to make complete and continuous the coast line of North America. He said he had been at Barabur Inlet, the East Cape.

"We have found a very primitive tribe, who have no intercourse with whites. They possess no iron and hunt an old, with spear and harpoon. He said he had been with two of these natives to accompany him westward toward the Melville delta.

COLD STORAGE DELEGATES AT COLD STORAGE FEED WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Cold storage products, from claims of \$100,000,000 served to the delegates at the annual of the third international congress of refrigeration in Chicago, September 22, according to an announcement made by the headquarters of the congress here. Even the fee for use of the convention hall was a cold storage production. Foreign delegates from 20 countries would be shown in the opinion of the congress officials, that American cold storage methods had been widely adopted.

The congress will convene here Monday when it will be addressed by Secretary Houston. A busy day of resolutions and sightseeing will follow and the delegates will begin for Chicago on Wednesday to take up the serious business of the meeting.

GRAND JURY BACKS PROPOSED HIGHWAY CALHOUN, Ga., Sept. 10.—The fall term of the Grand county superior court which has just adjourned after a two week session, was one of the busiest in the record of the court. Besides a large number of civil cases there were 12 criminal cases tried and disposed of. Those were mostly misdemeanor.

The grand jury continued its work for over a week and found 10 bills to be returned. In dealing with the road movement, the jury recommended that Gordon county commissioners be authorized to pass the proposed Johnson-Sherman highway from Chattanooga to Atlanta.

ROME SCHOOLS SHOW INCREASE OF 200 PUPILS ROME, Ga., Sept. 10.—The registration at the Rome public school reached 1,400 white and 520 colored, an increase of more than 200 over the same date last year. The high school showed an increase of fifty pupils over that of 1912, the attendance on the opening day being 250. There are fifty-three teachers employed in the white and colored schools.

DEAD MAN RIFLED BY VANDALS, IS REPORT SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.—Waller S. Baker, aged fifty-five, said to be a prominent attorney of Waco, was stricken on the street last night and died.

The police are investigating a report that several hundred dollars was missing from Baker's pockets. Baker's two feet were found to be turned inside out, his hat buttoned over.

DEMOCRATS TO WIDEN DIPLOMATIC SERVICE

Administration to Adopt Plan Whereby Appointments Will Be More Open

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 10.—A plan partially to let down the bars at the entrance of the diplomatic service and liberalize the method of choosing secretaries for legations and embassies is part of the administration's policy seeking to make that part of the government service more democratic than heretofore.

A committee was appointed to prepare a petition to the head clerk of the state department, with a view to indicating to ministers whether or not either of the parties contemplating matrimony had been divorced. This is not required by state law, but can be done, it is claimed, at the option of the marriage license clerk.

The ministers, however, probably will provide an exception in the case of persons who can furnish to them under oath evidence, including a transcript of the order of court, showing them to be the innocent party.

SENTENCE COMMUTED FOR CLINCH COUNTY NEGRO Governor Shlan Tuesday granted executive clemency to Lige Lane, the Clinch county negro who was sentenced to hang Wednesday for a killing near Homeville. The governor yielded to the petitions of the white men and women of Homeville, and commuted Lane's sentence to life imprisonment.

There was considerable doubt as to the identity of the negro who committed the murder, but the prison commission unanimously recommended the commutation.

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VACATIONISTS SHIVER BY BLACKENED RUINS

Fire That Swept Salisbury Beach Leaves 200 Homeless and Exposed to Cold

(By Associated Press.) SALISBURY BEACH, Mass., Sept. 10.—A heavy northeast windwhipping in from Massachusetts Bay at sunrise today found 200 homeless vacationists shivering under sooty covering on Salisbury Beach. Clad in thin clothing, men, women and children had stood guard all night over the few belongings they were able to rescue from the sweep of the fire that devastated the summer resort.

Heaps of smoking ruins were all that remained today of more than 200 cottages and seven hotels that were in the path of the flames. Hordes of coming arrests and a state police investigation were carried out by the police. The police arrived from Haver Hill, officials were apparently shocked that a second fire which broke out shortly after midnight at the southern end of the beach was of incendiary origin.

Conservative estimates this morning place the loss from the fire at \$200,000.

Statement From Southern Offices Says Roads Should Get Busy

Railroads are doing everything possible to avoid a car shortage during the coming rush season, according to a statement issued from the offices of the Southern Railway company Wednesday morning. The statement follows:

"Healthy business conditions throughout the southeast, during the fall and winter are indicated by the action of the railways of this section in calling upon shippers to add them in maintaining an adequate car supply during the crop moving season. Anticipating a heavy demand for cars, the railways are themselves doing everything possible to increase their car supply. Shops are being run at full capacity to put every available car in repair and car builders are being urged to turn out new equipment as rapidly as possible. Steps are being taken to provide for the most expeditious handling of cars at terminals and transfer points.

As an efficient car supply is as important to shippers as it is to the railways, it is urged that shippers individually and through trade and commercial bodies to add the railways in their effort to secure the maximum efficiency in the use of cars."

Famous Frank Case Given To Public in Book Form

Atlanta Publishing Company Issues Volume Describing in Graphic Form the South's Most Famous Murder Mystery-Book Was Placed on Sale at Local News Stands Wednesday

"The Frank Case" is the title of a paper-bound volume of 144 pages which reached The Journal from the presses of the Atlanta Publishing company Wednesday morning. The book, which the author says is a detailed and faithful account of the south's greatest murder mystery, will be placed on the news stands for sale during Wednesday. Its price is twenty-five cents.

In twenty-two chapters the book deals with Mary Phagan's murder in the National Penitentiary on April 26, the mystery which surrounded her death, the efforts of the city and private detective to find the slayer, and the final conviction of Lou M. Frank, the young superintendent of the factory.

The Frank case is the greatest mystery of the south and probably no other case ever attracted and held the interest of the Georgia public as did this mystery. If the author has made the most of his subject it should have a story more gripping than is found between the covers of most novels.

"In no other murder case," remarks the author in his preface, "has there been such intense interest, because more than a mere murder mystery; more than the story of a man in a position charged with slaying in a just passion a little factory girl."

In his preface the author states that he deals with phases of the case heretofore neglected or avoided and has endeavored at all times to handle all of the numerous angles of the case fairly and without favor.

"The story of the fearful crime," continues the preface, "of the prebital developments of the four months that followed it, and finally the story of the great trial, which for a solid month the two greatest criminal lawyers in the south battled against the keen wit of Atlanta's solicitor general, have all been told in the newspapers. Many of the interesting features of the case—those which made it more than a murder case—have never been told to the public because the subject was too delicate."

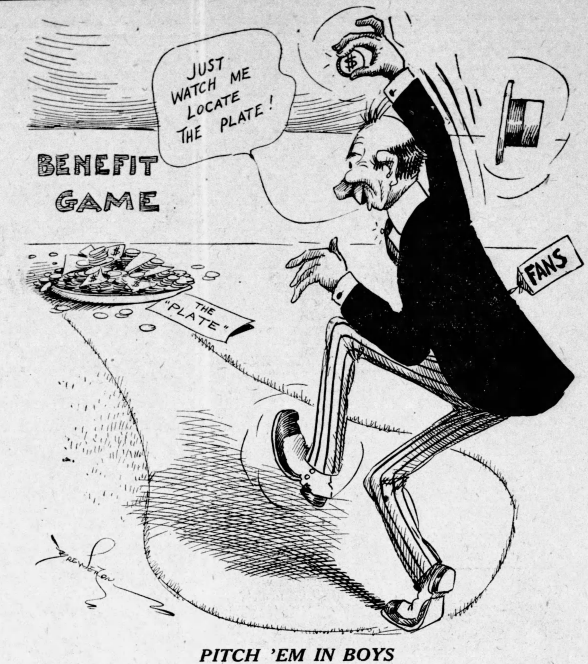

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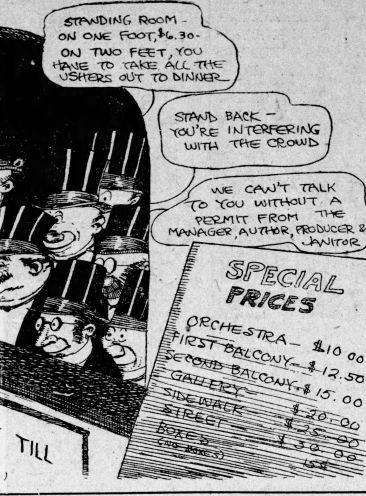
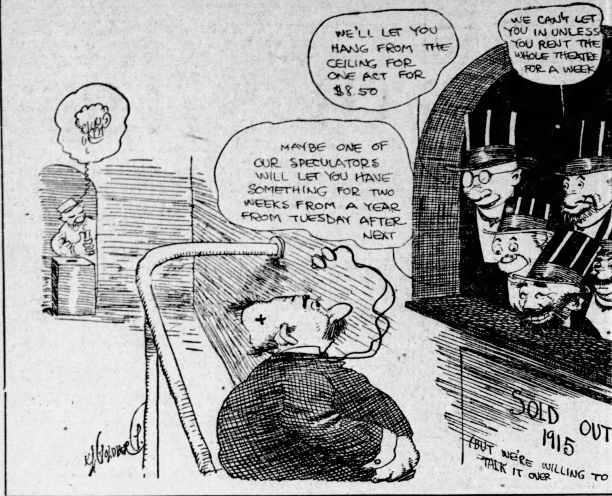
