Solicitor General Dorsey Declares Work of His Greatest Detective Has Been Completed.

WELCOMES AID OF BURNS IN CLEARING UP MYSTERY

Solicitor Hugh M. Dorsey said Saturday that his "greatest detective in America" would not figure again in the Phagan investigation, and that it was extremely doubtful whether he would be recalled to testify at the trial. "He has finished his investigation," said the Solicitor, "and we have no further need for him. A detective is one thing and a witness is another. His investigation led us to witnesses. It is not necessary for him, or any other detective, to tell the jury what a disinterested witness will tell." He would not say, however, whether his decision not to put the "greatest in America" on the witness stand would apply to the city, Pinkerton and Burns detectives.

Burns Man Works Quietly. The Burns investigator who took up the case Friday morning has not yet reported to the office of the Solicitor. He is quietly and systematically working out his own idea of the case after a comprehensive outline given him by Colonel Thomas.

Believe Next Les Innocent. Officers working on the Phagan strangling mystery Saturday declared they were more convinced that Next Les is the negro night watchman, had no hand in the tragedy and that he has been wrongfully arrested as the result of a conversation between the night watchman and two other negro prisoners in the "Tommy" building.

Whether this incident will figure in any way in the investigation before the grand jury has not been announced by Solicitor Dorsey.

Plans for the union of the Southern and United Presbyterian Assemblies, which if effected, will predominate one of the most momentous changes in the history of religious work in the United States, were submitted to those bodies at their morning sessions Saturday.

Rosillo, Obscure Airman, Accomplishes Fast First Time in Teeth of Gale.

RIVAL IN RACE, DELAYED, TRIES TO KILL HIMSELF.

Great Throng Greeted Daring Birdman on Early Morning Arrival in Havana.

KEY WEST, May 17.—In a fight which compares in daring with any other ever made on the North American continent, Domingo Rosillo, an obscure young Cuban aviator, flew over the Gulf of Mexico from here to Havana, Cuba, 50 miles away, in a Moisson airplane, winning the \$10,000 prize offered by the Havana Municipal Council for the first flight between the cities.

Rosillo, who was accompanied by a pilot, left Key West at 5:15 A. M. and landed in Havana at 8:15 A. M.

Augustine Faria, another aviator who was to race across the Gulf with Rosillo, attempted to have the daring little Cuban abandon the flight for fear of the high wind and roughness of the water. When Faria saw that Rosillo was determined to attempt the feat, he said he would accompany him.

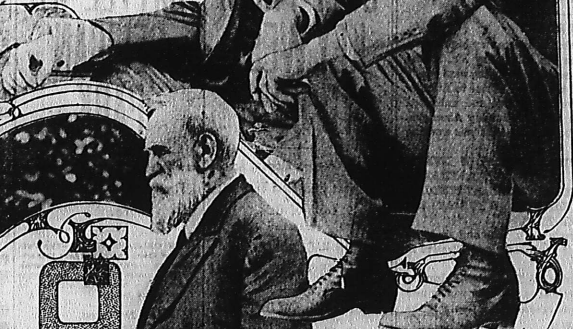

Everyday Christianity. The difference is frankly recognized, but holding our respective views in the forbearance of love, we suggest the following as a practicable basis: We believe that the Father of the Bible, the Psalmist of David, is an inspired man of praise and that the Spirit of God indicated these songs to be used in the worship of the people of God to the end of time...

FLIES ACROSS GULF FROM KEWEST TO CUBA

Rosillo, Obscure Airman, Accomplishes feat First Time in Teeth of Gale.

RIVAL IN RACE, DELAYED, TRIES TO KILL HIMSELF

Great Throng Greets Daring Birdman on Early Morning Arrival in Havana.

KEY WEST, May 17.—In a flight which compares in daring with any other ever made on the North American continent, Domingo Rosillo, an obscure young Cuban aviator, flew over the Gulf of Mexico from here to Havana, Cuba, 80 miles away, in a Moisant aeroplane, winning the \$10,000 prize offered by the Havana Municipal Council for the first flight between the cities. Rosillo left Key West at 5:35 a. m. and landed in Havana at 8:15 a. m.

Leaving the terminal of the East Coast Railroad in a gale of wind at 5:35 o'clock Rosillo skimmed across the intervening stretch of turbulent water without any mishap.

A sensational and dramatic incident, which almost cost a human life, attended the start of the flight.

Rival Threnates Suicide. Augustine Piria, another aviator who was to race across the gulf with Rosillo, attempted to have the daring Cuban abandon the flight for today because of the high wind and roughness of the water. When Piria saw that Rosillo was determined to start he began shouting threats and threats.

Such threats and finally his friends had to restrain him forcibly. Piria, in desperation, pulled a pistol from his pocket and placing the weapon against his forehead, threatened to kill himself unless he was allowed to start. Friends took the weapon from him.

Wind Held Plans Down. The aviator then entered his machine, which had been equipped with pontoons and which rested on the surface of the water. The wind was so high, however, that the aeroplane would not rise, and the wires holding the pontoons snapped. While they began adjusting over the machine and all hope of starting the flight was lost.

Meanwhile Rosillo, who had got a flying start, but on account of the southerly direction, bucking a stiff wind that threatened to send his aeroplane crashing upon the water.

A great crowd gathered to see the aviators start, but on account of the wind and the choppy sea it was believed that neither man would attempt a flight. At 7 o'clock Rosillo sent a radio telegram to Murro Casse asking after the condition of the weather off the Cuban Coast. The reply came back that flying conditions there were ideal.

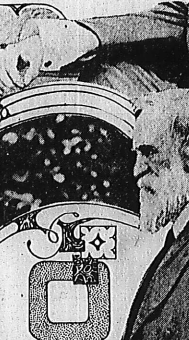

As to the principles involved in this union, there was no difference of opinion, but there was not perfect agreement touching the order of one of the articles.

Common Standing Ground. In believing in the essential oneness of the church of Christ, remembering the historic lines that bind us to revered ancestors who witnessed faith and through whom has come to us a common heritage of Christian faith and doctrine, desiring to prove faithful in the establishment of this union, and aiming only for the glory of God in the higher advancement and wider extension of His kingdom upon earth, we, the members of the Presbyterian Church in the United States and the members of the Presbyterian Church of North America, do hereby agree to unite in a common standing ground and around the following statements and upon the basis of these statements, to enter into a covenant to join our ecclesiastical bodies in organic union.

Invested by the Father with the reward of His suffering. These are: A dominion over the church, of which He is the living head and lawgiver and source of all that divine influence and authority by which He is sanctifying and governing; and also a dominion over all created beings and things, which is exercised by Him in subduing to the manifestation of His glory in the system of redemption and the best interests of His church.

As to the constitution of the person of our Redeemer, the Scriptures plainly teach that He was conceived by the Holy Ghost in the womb of the Virgin Mary and was born without human father. He lived a life of perfect obedience and by the shedding of His blood made full atonement for sin and purchased redemption for his people.

The Church's Mission. We believe that the Gospel of the Son of God, the only hope of a sinful world, is to be proclaimed in the commands of His love, and in the sanctification of the world, and we bow before the imperative duty of sending the message of the Word for a witness among all nations.

Executive Agencies to Continue. All executive agencies shall continue to exist, and shall seek to devise some method by which, with the authoritative action of the General Assembly, and the approval of the whole church, they may become completely identified. Before however such complete consolidation takes place, careful study shall be taken after consultation with competent authorities to safeguard and preserve all property rights affected by the union of churches.

There is a difference in the historic faith and practice of the two churches touching the matter of praise in the worship of God. The one church holds the belief that the Book of Psalms is the perfect and divinely credited manual of praise, and as such is to be used in worship to the exclusion of all devotional compositions of uninspired persons.

Believe Praise Inspired. We believe that the Psalter of the Bible, the Psalms of David, and that the Spirit of God indited these songs to be used in the worship of the people of God in the end of time. The United Church will, therefore, take immediate steps to introduce to all its congregations, by indorsing and recommending the Psalms of the Bible in the best metrical version as a divinely accredited book of praise. But while strongly commending the use of the Psalms, it is agreed that each church in our respective synods shall be allowed in the exercise of its liberty to use any other hymns or songs which it may desire to use, provided that such hymns or songs be of a character which will honor the name of Christ and the extension of His Kingdom.

As to the basis of representation and in the conduct and the proceedings of the First General Assembly, the Book of Church Order of the Presbyterian Church in the United States shall be authoritative. The Unions shall continue to use provisionally the book of rules under which they have hitherto been governed. The Synods and Presbyteries shall remain as at present constituted until such time as it shall manifestly appear that some change is needed for the best in

HUNTOHAGAN SLAYER BY WRITING CLEWS

Famous Expert Employed by Solicitor Dorsey Examines Notes Found in Pencil Factory. BURNS OPERATIVE WORKS IN SECRET ON MYSTERY

State Declares Guilty Man Will Be Captured Within Month. Lee Thought Innocent. With powerful microscopes, magnifying glasses and a series of reflecting mirrors Solicitor General Hugh H. Dorsey and his detective, assisted by a handwriting expert, who is said to be one of the best in the country, are minutely examining the "handwriting clues" in the Hagan mystery.

The two notes found in the basement of the pencil factory, specimen of the handwriting of the two men held in the Tower in connection with the murder, letters and notes written by the slain girl and the handwriting on the books of the pencil factory are being subjected to rigid tests. Accurate measurements of each letter and each word, the angle of the slant in forming the letters and its formation of certain letters that experts claim no two men write alike, are some of the tests applied.

The Burns investigator who took up the case Friday morning has not yet reported to the office of the solicitor. He is quietly and systematically working out his own idea of the case after a comprehensive outline given him by Colonel Thomas H. Pender. He has succeeded so far in keeping his identity secret.

"We will have the slayer in less than a month," said Colonel Felder, an confident the Burns men will meet with every success. With Mr. Burns in Europe, the man has been sent to Atlanta as certainly the best detective in America. He has charge of the Burns work in this country and is his chief right-hand man. Mr. Burns himself will be on the scene shortly after June 1, and then I am confident the case will be closed beyond any shadow of a doubt."

KEY WEST, FLA., MAY 17.—THE FIRST SUCCESSFUL AEROPLANE FLIGHT OVER THE GULF OF MEXICO FROM THE UNITED STATES TO CUBA WAS MADE TO-DAY BY DOMINGO ROSILLO, A YOUNG CUBAN AVIATOR, WHO WON A PRIZE OF \$10,000, OFFERED BY THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF HAVANA FOR ACCOMPLISHING FEAT.

FIRST AIR TRIP, KEY WEST TO HAVANA, WINS \$10,000

Rosillo Flies in Gale Over Rough Sea--Rival for Honor Delayed, Tries to Commit Suicide.

KEY WEST, FLA., May 17.—The first successful aeroplane flight over the Gulf of Mexico from the United States to Cuba was made to-day by Domingo Rosillo, a young Cuban aviator, who won a prize of \$10,000 offered by the Municipal Council of Havana for accomplishing the feat.

Leaving the terminal of the East Coast railroad in a gale of wind at 5:35 o'clock in a Moisant machine, Rosillo skimmed across the intervening stretch of turbulent water without mishap. A wireless telegram from Havana stated that Rosillo was flying over Havana at 7:31 o'clock. He landed at 8:15 o'clock.

A sensational and dramatic incident, which almost cost a human life, attended the start of the flight. Rival Threats Suicidal.

Augustine Paris, another aviator who was to race across the gulf with Rosillo, attempted to have the daring little Cuban abandon the flight for to-day because of the high wind and roughness of the water. When Paris saw that Rosillo was determined to start he began to overhaul his Curtiss biplane. Friends intervened, saying: "It would be sure death to start in this gale, and if you should fall into the water the ways are so high you would be drowned."

Paris persisted and finally his friends had to restrain his forcibly. Paris, in desperation, pulled a pistol from his pocket and, placing the weapon against his forehead, threatened to kill himself unless he was allowed to start. Friends took the weapon from him.

Wind Held Plane Down. The aviator then entered his machine, which had been equipped with pontoons and which rested on the surface of the water. The flight was so high, however, that the aeroplane would not rise, and the wires holding the pontoons snapped. Waves then began splashing over the machine and all hope of starting the flight was lost. Meanwhile Rosillo, who had got a flying start, had disappeared in a southwestward direction. A stiff wind that threatened to send his aeroplane crashing upon the water was a great crowd gathered to see the aviator's start, but on account of the wind and the choppy sea it was believed that neither man would attempt a flight.
