MOTHER AND GIRL DEAD IN FIRE; SON IS HUNTED

Sheriff Sees Slaying Mystery in Burning of Farm House Near Atlanta--Finds Evidence.

That the mother and girl whose charred remains were found in the ruins of their seven years old southeast of Atlanta early Wednesday morning were murdered and the house set afire by the murderer in an effort to obliterate all evidence of the deed was the astounding declaration made by Sheriff J. A. McCurdy after an investigation of the tragedy.

Positive identifications of the two women as Mrs. S. C. Stevens, 40 years old, wife of William Stevens, a 70-year-old Confederate veteran now in Chattanooga at the reunion, and their adopted daughter, Nellie Stevens, 13 years old, were made by neighbors.

The charred bodies of the women were found lying in the center of a bed room in the rear of the cottage. Near at hand were the remains of a shotgun.

That the door of the room was open at the time of the encounter is believed to add another link to prove the affair a murder.

made to the police Tuesday night, Conley declared that instead of writing the notes on Friday he wrote them Saturday about four minutes before 11 o'clock.

His second statement is unimpaired by the fact that the negro has related his first activities. It may be interpreted further by the development that at the time he says Frank was dictating the notes to him, Frank was a matter of feet from a window looking out on the street.

Frank and the other three persons in the kitchen at the time were a few minutes of 1 o'clock that Frank came upstairs and said that he was going to leave the building and that if the three did not wish to go with him they would have to leave.

Unable to Prove Whereabouts. He was unable, however, to corroborate his declaration that he was on Deane Street between 2 o'clock in the afternoon. He could name no one he had seen there those hours.

Despite the new developments, the detectives of course stand firmly by their theory of Frank's guilt. They declare that they have the testimony of four handwriting experts that the writing on the notes found in the body of Mary Phagan positively is that of Frank.

Contradicted by Wife. Miss Conley, wife of James Conley, whose confession that he wrote the mysterious notes found at the site of murdered Mary Phagan, has developed into one of the most important incidents of the case, a statement to a Georgian reporter on Wednesday morning bearing on the whereabouts of her husband on the afternoon of the murder that is utterly at variance with statements made by Conley.

Conley has repeatedly told detectives that on the evening of April 26, the night Mary Phagan was murdered, he left his home at 172 Rhodes Street at 5 o'clock and went there remaining there until 8.

He returned here about midnight. The woman who says she had seen him there on Saturday afternoon is Mrs. F. A. Crawford, a negro woman who lives at 176 Rhodes Street, next door to Conley.

Accused Negro Conley. In an effort to discover how the negro Jim Conley, now the center of attention in the Phagan mystery, was connected with the National Football league by the girls employed in the factory, where Conley worked as a sweeper.

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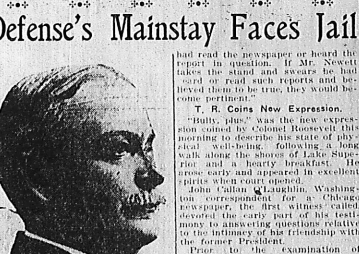

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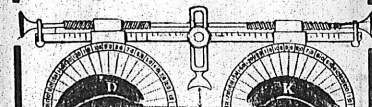

BODIES OF MOTHER AND GIRL IN RUINS OF HOME; SON HUNTED

Sheriff Sees Slaying Mystery in Burning to Death of Mrs. S. C. Stevens and Her Daughter in Lonely Farm House--Find Evidence of Crime.

That the mother and girl whose charred remains were found in the ruins of their home seven miles southeast of Atlanta early Wednesday morning were murdered and the house set afire by the murderer in an effort to obliterate all evidence of the deed was the astounding declaration made by Sheriff J. A. McCurdy after an investigation of the tragedy.

Conditions leading up to the theory that the deaths were the result of murder are these: The charred bodies of the women were found lying in the center of a bed room in the rear of the cottage. Near at hand were the remains of a shotgun.

Mrs. Stevens' skull had been crushed in. A hoe found in what had been the hallway leading from the room is believed to have been the instrument used to strike the woman as she arose to meet her husband, and the shotgun, next to the intruder.

The door of the room was open at the time of the encounter. It is believed to add another link to prove the affair a murder. The man in which the daughter met her death was not ascertained, owing to the charred condition of her body.

Son Quarreled With Mother. Inquiry among the neighbors developed the fact that Wade Stevens, the 15-year-old son, who disappeared from his home Tuesday afternoon, had quarreled with his mother and sister.

Mr. L. G. Self, who lives a short distance from the Stevens home, told Sheriff McCurdy that the boy had a fit with his parent because she would not permit him to come to Atlanta during the absence of his father.

Another development, that tends to show murder, came with the discovery that the skull of Nellie Stevens had been fractured. A sharp crack across the top of the head showed possibility, that a knife-like weapon had been used, striking with such force as to cleave the bone.

That the murderer had struck the girl with his hoof after crushing Mrs. Stevens' skull.

Mrs. Stevens' skull, it was shown, was crushed in by a blow directed at her from in front. Her body was found just three feet from the doorway. Directly behind this lay the body of Nellie Stevens.

It is thought that Mrs. Stevens, when she took up the shotgun and started towards the door at the sound of the intruder, was followed by her daughter. When the older woman opened the door, Nellie was directly behind her. The murderer, then, if he stood just without the doorway, with his hands on a gun, Mrs. Stevens fell. With a second blow he felled the girl behind her.

Hutcheson, in commenting upon Hutcheson's charges, declared that they were inspired by Thomas B. Felder, Whittam & Dillon, who are an open letter to chief of Police Beavers, charging him with permitting unlawful houses to operate on certain city streets and promising to give addresses if the chief asks personally from them within three days.

Characterizing Carl Hutcheson as of too little importance to warrant an answer, his charges made against the police force, Chief Beavers declared that he would ignore him altogether.

"I don't care to answer Hutcheson's attack," said the police official. "Hutcheson is too small a fry to even take notice of. An answer to him would give him too much dignity. This money being used as a tool of Felder and his gang, Felder is permitted to make the statement. He is not a member of the police force and he has no address."

"This matter is going before the Grand Jury and not Carl Hutcheson," he said.

On Monday morning Chief Beavers declared Attorney Thomas B. Felder had no evidence of police cognizance of immoral resorts; that he never had had any, and that he was only bluffing when he said he had. Requested to reply, Colonel Felder announced he would make no more statements except in writing, and that he had nothing to say then.

SUSPICION TURNED ON CONLEY; ACCUSED BY FACTORY FOREMAN

Negro, Whose Story That He Wrote Notes at Frank's Dictation Is Generally Disbelieved, Was Often Drunk. Mrs. White Can Not Identify Him.

Suspicion in the Phagan case was Tuesday morning turned full force upon James Conley, the negro whose unexpected assertion last week that he had written the notes found beside the body of Mary Phagan, at the dictation of Leo M. Frank, was followed by a speedy indictment of the pencil factory superintendent.

In the opinion of E. F. Holloway, timekeeper and foreman in the factory, Conley is the guilty man.

Careful study of the negro's story has revealed many absurdities in its structure, wherein evidences of childish cunning are rife in an effort to throw the blame onto Frank. It is this which has served to bring the deed to Conley's door.

However, Mrs. Arthur White, wife of a machinist at the factory, who testified that she saw a negro lurking in the building between 12 noon and 2 o'clock on the afternoon of the murder, denied the published report in an afternoon paper that she had identified Conley as the one. Mrs. White stated Tuesday morning that she had secured only a glimpse of the man. It may have been Conley, or another negro. Mrs. White was asked to pick Conley out of a crowd of twelve negroes some time ago, but her identification was a second choice.

The police, in spite of bending every effort to show that Frank is guilty, therefore, have resorted to a dissection of Conley's story. One of its weakest links, they believe, is the negro's quotation of Frank's statement to him: "Why should I hang? That the superintendent should place this confidence in the negro sweeper appears absurd."

Another damning point against Conley lies in the declaration of Holloway, who is foreman of the factory, that he had appeared for duty indicated on several occasions; that his duties as sweeper brought him in contact with the girls, who fed him.

Where Was Conley?
According to Conley's story, he was on Peter Street, from 6 o'clock until 2 in the afternoon of the murder. Police investigation of this has failed to prove his statement. Conley admits that he can not remember anyone whom he saw during that time to support his statement. From 2 o'clock until 6 Conley was at his home. This has been proven. Conley declares that from 6 until 8 o'clock that night he was down town. This also has not been established. Conley states he stayed there the remainder of the night.

According to the new theory of Conley's implication, the negro wrote the notes on Saturday instead of Friday, as he claims, and not on anybody's dictation. It is further argued that in order to incriminate himself with the law, he made his confession when he thought that the case against Frank was closed—that his story was the product of his own imagination.

State Faces Big Task in Trial of Frank as Slayer

What will be the defense of Leo M. Frank when he is called upon next month to answer to the charge of strangling little Mary Phagan?
With the confident announcement of the police Monday that the state has completed a case against the factory superintendent that may be considered as it possibly could be without the testimony of actual witnesses, the evidence here, this question naturally is being asked by many who have any interest in the mystery, and that means practically every person in Atlanta.

The people will not get their answer from Luther Z. Bosser, who has been named as the chief attorney of Frank, until the trial actually begins.
At this early date, when only the vaguest of hints have been given as to the course that will be followed in the battle to free Frank from all charges, it is patent that there are some questions offered by the state, which attack upon the theories of the State Bardeen of Georgia.

Those who are close to the daily developments in Atlanta's baffling murder mystery and who venture to predict the course of the trial, are of the opinion that the state in some manner, by some means, will bring to the jury Frank directly with the crime or establish his connection with it in a reasonable doubt.

The law will not permit Frank's conviction for the crime merely because the detective has discovered that he had the opportunity. It will not permit his conviction, if no convincing evidence is found that he murdered because he is unable to put his hands on another man and say, 'It is the man you want.'
It is not the intention of the law to make a man simply because in one place can be found who is the more likely culprit.

After the State has presented its reasons for believing in the guilt of the State, it is regarded as likely that the defense will claim that of all that the State has failed to establish, Frank's connection with the crime beyond a reasonable doubt. The defense will represent that the most the State has done is to establish that he had the opportunity to commit the murder.

Frank never was seen with the girl, either on the day of the crime or before. It is not known that he ever spoke to her except in connection with her work. Nothing was found to point the finger of accusation directly at Frank, so far as the public has been informed. None of Frank's clothing has been found with blood stains upon it. Now, if his personal belongings were found near his girl's body, it would be nothing to be discovered in the search of the clothes that fastened the crime on him.

small amount might prove an incentive to some persons, the defense very likely will argue. And it is not at all certain that the robber, if robbery was the motive, had any idea that the amount he would obtain would be so small.

It is probable that Frank would have taken the trouble to hide the girl's purse when it could not have been sustained in any way by any particular persons had it been lying near her body. In a question that can be put to the jurors in this connection.

Will Attack Officer.

For it is very much on the order of probabilities that the police are basing their expectations of conviction.

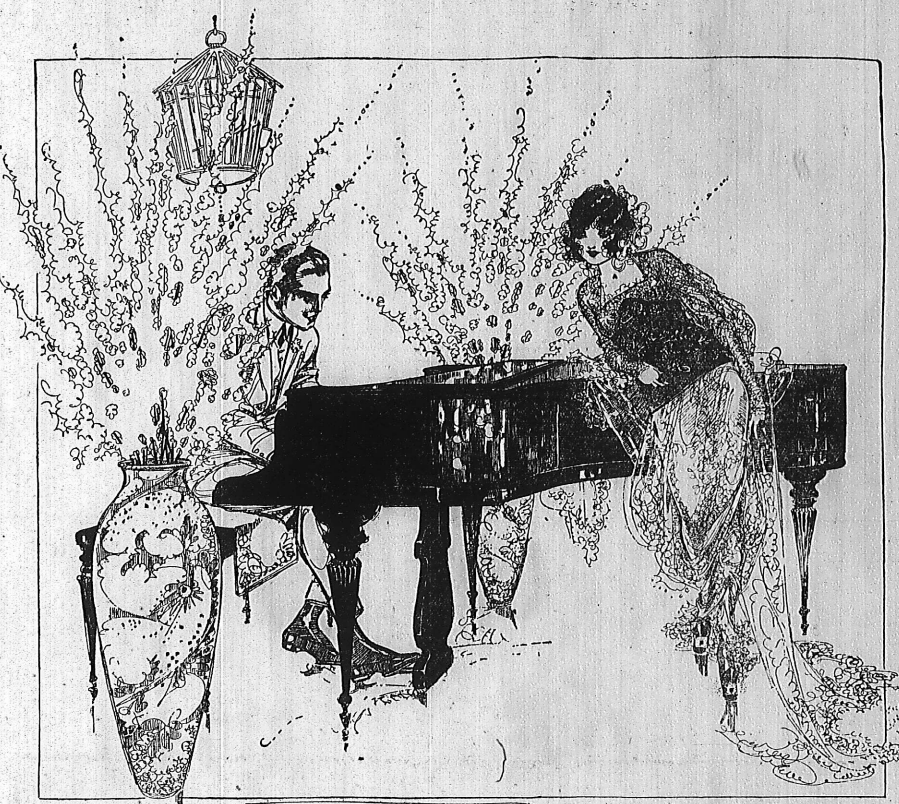
