BALANCE REPORT FOR LEAGUE ASSASSINATED

SAYS WOMEN OVERHEARD CONFESSION

Attorney Leavitt Declares Tale That Negro Admitted Killing Girl Will Stand Test.

That several negro women overheard Jim Conley when he ran the insurance agent, Mincey, away with the alleged statement that he had just killed a girl and didn't want to kill any one else, and that the affidavits from the women are in the hands of the attorneys for the defense, was stated Saturday by Attorney J. H. Leavitt, who aided in obtaining the sensational affidavit from Mincey.

Attorney Leavitt defended the character of the man who made the affidavit and denied emphatically that Mincey even asked about the money he would receive as a witness, except whether his railroad was paid if he were out of the city.

"I am attorney for the American Insurance Company and know its manager, J. S. Dukes, very well," said Leavitt. "He sought to discredit the affidavit very likely because Mincey left his employer to get a better position and he had to do some of the outside work. Mincey is a college graduate and is well known in Atlanta. It will be utterly impossible to shake his evidence."

"I am not employed to represent Frank and aided in getting this affidavit purely because I happened to stumble on to the information. Before I submitted it to Mr. Rosen, Frank's attorney, I spent several days investigating the character of the man, questioning the women in the neighborhood and generally verifying the facts. When I turned it over to him I was convinced of its absolute truth and that it would stand the acid test."

Habes Corpus Fight Fails.

Habes corpus proceedings to release New Lee collapsed in the court of Judge Ellis Saturday morning.

By agreement, Edward L. Chappell, representing Lee, withdrew his application for a habes corpus. Solicitor Rosen promised to present a bill against Lee as a suspect in the Phagan murder case, with the expectation that a "no bill" would be returned. This appeared satisfactory to the attorneys for Lee, as well as to the State.

Justice Goff based his denial on the ground that the same evidence could have been discovered before the trial.

Seeking Crawford

CORONER'S WARRANT HELD ILLEGAL

Delay in Hearing Will Mean Woman's Commitment to Jail, Attorney Says.

Following close upon a decision by Superior Court Justice Pendleton Saturday morning that a warrant signed by the Coroner of Carroll County was not enforceable in Fulton County, C. Z. Crawford, a nephew and beneficiary under the \$100,000 will of Joshua B. Crawford, went before Justice of the Peace C. H. Girardeau and swore out a second warrant charging the widow, Mary Belle Crawford, with murder.

Constables R. F. Mauldin and W. W. Rogers went immediately to the home of Mrs. Crawford at West Peachtree and Fourteenth streets, to arrest her and take her before Justice Girardeau for commitment trial.

The first warrant, charging Mrs. Crawford with murder was signed by Coroner C. W. Wain, of Carroll County, who had disinterred the body of Joshua B. Crawford and found evidence of poison. Crawford fled in Fulton county March 27, 1909.

Hearing May Be Delayed.

The warrant reached Atlanta Friday and Sheriff Mangum notified Mrs. Crawford to appear before Justice of the Peace D. K. Johnson Saturday morning, when a hearing would be held as to the authority of the Sheriff to serve the warrant in Fulton County.

Colonel J. S. James, attorney for the heirs, said later that he did not know whether both sides would be ready for the commitment trial, as the prosecution has several material witnesses out of the State.

In the event of delay in the commitment hearing, he said, Justice Girardeau would have no other alternative than to commit Mrs. Crawford to jail.

Arnold Sees Exonerated.

Attorney Arnold said Mrs. Crawford would be completely exonerated at the prospective hearing before a justice of the peace. He said the action was nothing more than a move to "force" civil procedure.

"It is not really the Crawford heirs who are fighting me," said Mrs. Crawford, "but the rather distant relatives who were not mentioned in any will. I settled with the real heirs according to the will left by Mr. Crawford's first wife. Every one was satisfied."

"I gave Charlie Crawford more than he was ever entitled to by the will that was made before I even knew the man I later married. He thanked me for the generosity by later telling me the very distant relatives prevail upon him to fight me. He decided then an interest in his share of the property and filed suit. Since then he has fought me. The closer relatives have never been anything but my best friends."

Sheriff Mangum will select the Justice Court for the hearing instead of the attorneys. It is more than likely it will start in the forenoon, and it is not probable it will be necessary to conclude Monday.

MEXICO CITY, July 12.—Formal protest was lodged today by the United States Government against the action of the Mexican Government in allowing the Mexican press to stir up anti-American feeling.

Two notes were presented by United States Ambassador H. L. Wilson. At the same time denial was made of the report that United States warships in the harbor at Guaymas used their wireless and searchlights to aid the rebels.

The newspapers have resorted to scathing denunciations and rictus, although no arrests have been reported. Notices have been posted in the schools here for the children to secure small Japanese flags. These will be carried in a procession of children who will welcome the new Japanese Ambassador upon his arrival.

Jap Concessions Reported.

Mexico is cementing her relations with Japan, and it is reported that a special envoy will soon be sent to Tokyo to invite the investment of Japanese capital and rich concessions will be given, it is said.

Following is a translation of the notes posted in the schools:

The representative of the Japanese Emperor to our Government is about to arrive in Mexico. The attitude of mutual sympathy and esteem which our people and the people of Japan profess is well known.

"We firmly believe that the time has come to render a public and solemn testimony of international sympathy. Therefore, the students of all the schools are asked to be at the railway station, each carrying a Japanese flag, to receive the Japanese Emperor's representative."

"This act will be significant and of great importance. The day and hour of the Japanese Ambassador's arrival will be announced later."
