STOP THE PHAGAN CASE BY CHAPTERS

Slaying of Factory Girl, South's Most Baffling Crime Mystery, Reviewed in Detail.

CHAPTER I.

Will the well of mystery be lifted when the curtain rises next Monday on another scene in Atlanta's darkest tragedy?

A vast audience, shocked by the horror of Mary Phagan's fate on a Saturday of last April and held through the succeeding weeks in the thrall of the baffling crime drama, in suspense awaits this question's answer.

Will Fulton County's Solicitor General be able to point his finger at Leo M. Frank and exclaim, "This man who strangled Mary Phagan?"

Or will Luther Ross, certain to be a towering and masterful factor in the trial, strike the scales to be staged, amass his strength, bring to bear the secret evidence that has been in his possession for weeks, beat down every whisper of suspicion that the State has erected about the prisoner, and, as a dramatic finale, assail the negro, Jim Conley, covered in the witness stand, with a raking volley of questions that will leave the man shaken and terrified, a confessor of the crime upon his lips?

These are the most intense interest on the outcome.

No other crime event attracted Georgia to its depths as has the slaying of the little girl, who, in the eyes of the people throughout the State, is the most criminal mystery that has no other case in which the public's interest remained as fervent as through these months filled with other exciting events. From the time the first flames of the details of the fatal killing in the National Pencil Factory until the present, there has appeared to be no diminution in the desire to learn each day's developments.

It was in the early days of the tragedy a cry for summary vengeance upon the murderer, but the State's policy this into a universal demand for justice, which is no more demonstrated in that it is not so demonstrated as the first hot wave of indignation.

The Phagan case has remained in the public mind partly of course, because it has remained as baffling a mystery as the most detectives have encountered. With the mystery solved by a case of interest generally would have died out, but a review of the tragic features of the drama so far as it has progressed and a consideration of those who have participated in it supplies an explanation of why the case has remained in the public mind.

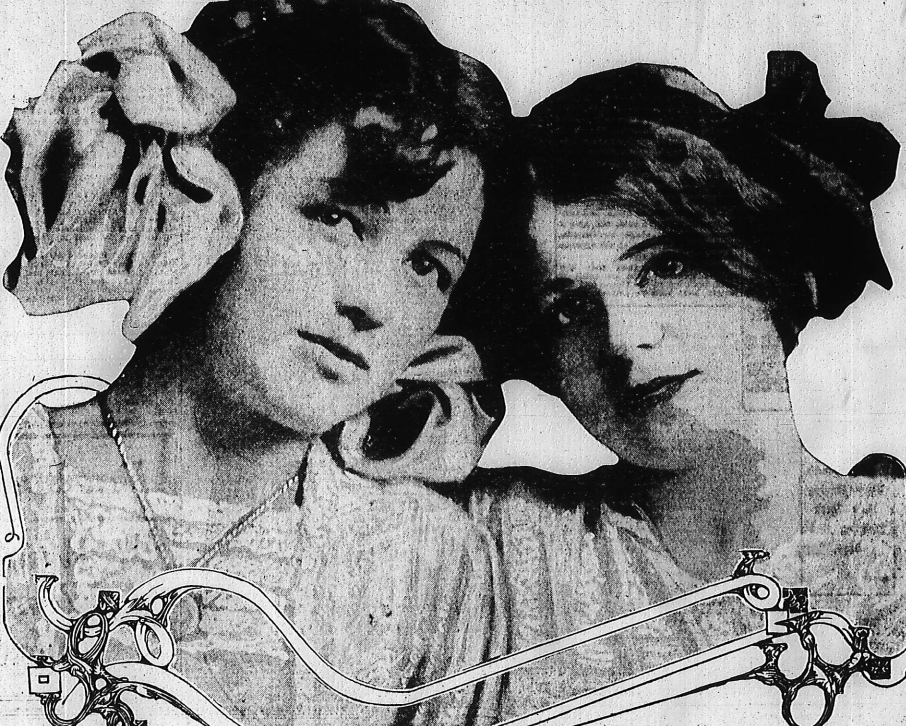

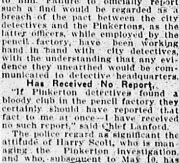

THIEF SHOT RESISTING ARREST

Heard Glass Crash.

The young women, while working at 2:10 o'clock Wednesday morning heard the sound of breaking glass as the burglars smashed the window of the candy store.

Looking out of the exchange window the girls saw the two men enter a store. A third posted himself on the corner as lookout.

While several of the young women watched the burglars, another of the girls telephoned police headquarters and notified the police.

Assistant Chief Satt, Captain Mayo, Call Officers Watson and Anderson and Policeman McWilliams went to the scene in an automobile. "As the car, driven at top speed, dashed up to the front of the candy store, the negro officers coming and ran. The police, thinking he was the only man in the job, started in pursuit, but were called back by the telephone girls, who were gathered at the windows of the plant Call Policeman Mack.

"Come back," they cried, "there are two others in the store!"

An eye turned and a crowd hurried back to the store, who were dashed out of the front door and ran up Ivy street, with the police in pursuit. The negroes turned down Ivy street and ran to the plant of Call Policeman Mack.

LEGISLATOR ACCUSES 'SOULE'

Assembly Likely to Probe Report False Representation Was Made to Boost Salary.

Representative Conner, of Spalding County, introduced a resolution in the House to-day calling for a legislative investigation of the State Agricultural College at Athens, particularly with respect to Dr. Andrew M. Soule's connection therewith.

Mr. Conner's resolution recites the fact that Dr. Soule has been publicly accused in The Southern Farmer, a poultry and agricultural magazine, with having obtained a percentage in salary upon false representations, and calls upon the Legislature to investigate the charges and summon Dr. Soule before the Committee on Appropriations to answer the same.

It also provides for the summoning of B. M. Blackburn, the editor of the magazine, who is held responsible for the charges, to come before the committee and substantiate them, if he can.

The magazine charged that Dr. Soule recently asked the board to raise his salary from \$5,000 to \$6,000 and based his appeal upon the ground that he had been offered a salary of \$6,000 per annum to serve in a similar capacity in the Minnesota College of Agriculture.

The magazine says Dr. Soule never was offered any such sum to serve in the Minnesota college, nor any sum whatever, and that his correspondence with the Minnesota college was very brief, and resulted speedily in the choice of another man for the place.

The "Farmer" prints that which purports to be documentary evidence to sustain this charge.

Besides the direct allegation of obtaining a raise in salary on false representation to the Georgia College management, the magazine attacks Dr. Soule vigorously for incompetency and general unfitness for the office he holds.

FRIEDMANN 'CURE' FAILS THORNTON

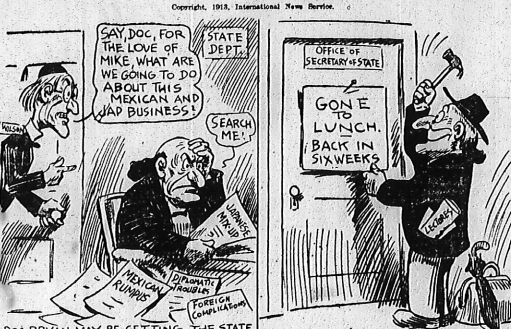

SIDE LIGHTS on GEORGIA POLITICS

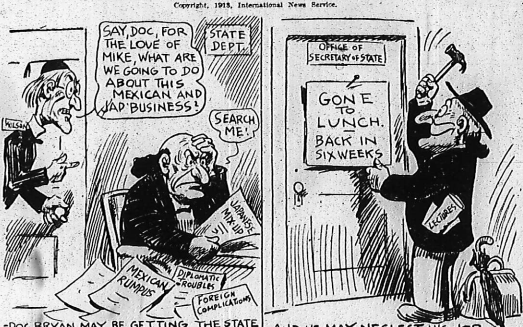
