SLATON BOOM FOR SENATOR REVIVES OLD STATE FIGHT

Governor Keeps Silence While His Friends Sound Georgia, and the Hoke Smith Clan Prepares to Decide the Factional Struggle

Joe Brown and His Successor Will Undoubtedly Get Together on Program Before Announcement Is Made of Either's Candidacy.

There is a well-defined, positive and aggressive movement on to nominate Governor John M. Slaton for Senator in next year's primary.

The Governor himself is not known to be a party to it, and the impression is that he is not, at least, directly.

Nevertheless, the Slaton senatorial boom is on, and it is causing no end of comment, not only among members of the Legislature now in Atlanta and visiting statesmen, but throughout the State generally.

Governor Slaton certainly has said no public word that can be twisted or construed into the suggestion of his senatorial candidacy, and it probably is true that he has given the matter only the most casual thought thus far.

It is generally taken for granted that Senator Hoke Smith will be a candidate to succeed himself. He has served a portion of Senator Clay's unexpired term and has given his friends to understand that he will be in the August primary of next year.

Brown Means Disagreement. If there is to be a hotly contested senatorial campaign next year, therefore, it likely will open along about May.

Before Governor Brown retired from the Executive Office, his name frequently was discussed for the senatorial succession.

The wiser and more experienced advocates of things political in Georgia predict confidently that Governor Slaton and former Governor Brown will not both be in the senatorial race, and that whichever announces, if either, it will be with a pretty thorough understanding of what the other will do.

The opponents, therefore, are figuring a senatorial race next year with Senator Smith on the one hand and either Governor Brown or Governor Slaton on the other.

Which one it shall be probably will be thrashed out between this time and January 1, 1914.

If Governor Slaton elects to have a try for the Senate next year, thereby giving up the Governorship at the expiration of a first term, it will precipitate a very warm fight for the Executive succession, and already rumor is flying that up also.

Both Factions Grow Men. In the event Governor Slaton announces for the Senate, if he fails that Congressman Hardwick will be put in the race for Governor by the friends of Senator Smith, and that Congressman Gordon Lee or former President of the Senate W. S. West will be his opponent, put forth by the Slaton and Brown people.

In addition to the aforementioned gubernatorial prospects, reported more or less willing to have themselves figured upon, it is being stage-whispered that Speaker Burwell and President Anderson, of the present Legislature, have their ears to the ground and Attorney General Thomas S. Felker is another Barkley thought to be not absolutely and altogether unwilling.

Old Foes Once More. Of course, if the Slaton senatorial boom really isn't a boom at all, and if the Governor should put a quietus upon it, why, then, the rather pretty and thrilling house of cards the wise political wigwags have set up will tumble down, and the near senatorial race will resolve itself, perhaps, into a fight between two ancient enemies, Senator Hoke Smith and former Governor "Little Joe" Brown.

If that race materializes, it will be hot enough for all ordinary purposes to be sure, and in a way it would be

WORK OF CHOOSING JURY FOR TRIAL OF FRANK DIFFICULT Meniremen Searchingly Examined by Both State and Defense

Slightest Objection Used to Disqualify--Attorneys Shrewdly Gauge Candidates from Every Angle.

In the selection of the twelve men to comprise the jury which will try Leo M. Frank for the murder of Mary Phagan, one of the bitterest contests of the great legal battle which begins Monday is anticipated.
That counsel for both the defense and state will probe deep into the character of each of the men drawn from the venire of 144 who take the stand for examination for jury service in this case is certain. The attorneys endeavor to unearth in the character of the prospective jurymen such traits as they may believe favorable or unfavorable to their cause.
The slightest objection will be used to disqualify the man from becoming a member of the deciding tribunal. Under the examination of such skilled lawyers as those who will appear in the Phagan case no lots of information which will tend to sway the verdict will remain concealed to be carried into the jury box and fight against the delivery of justice.
Every man of the twelve who will be chosen will be an open book to the counsel of both sides. Not only will his memory be shrewdly gauged with respect to the evidence to be presented, but his past life will be searched for a link in the chain of make-up which may prove a weak link in governing his decisions.

Difficulty Expected.
In view of the widespread circulation of the murder has aroused throughout Fulton County, great difficulty is expected in securing men of unbiased minds.

Probably the first question to be asked each juror when he takes the stand, after being sworn, will be: "Have you formed and expressed any opinion in regard to the guilt or innocence of the prisoner at the bar?"
The negative answer to this question will begin the examination of the prospective jurymen. Since the crime of which the pencil factory superintendent is accused is punishable by death, the next question in importance, especially to the prosecution, will be: "Are you conscientiously opposed to capital punishment?"
By an affirmative answer to either of the two questions above, the juror undoubtedly will be disqualified from jury duty.

(Owing to the vast importance of the Frank trial, every juror will be sworn to keep the names of the venire and the names of the prospective jurors confidential and not to discuss them with any person.)
Each juror will be examined upon each man, however, who passes satisfactorily to the great weighing questions of opinion and capital punishment, the opposing counsel will center their ring of penetrating questions.

Taken from the criminal code of Georgia, the following questions and provisions will govern the juror:
"Have you, from having seen the crime committed, or having heard any of the testimony delivered on oath, formed and expressed any opinion in regard to the guilt or innocence of the prisoner at the bar?"
"If your mind perfectly impartial between the State and the accused?"
If he shall answer these questions satisfactorily, he shall be sworn as a juror, and a competent juror in all cases where the offense does not involve the life of the accused, but when it does, the following additional question shall be put to him:
"Are you conscientiously opposed to capital punishment?"
Judge's Word Final.
If he shall answer this question in the negative, he shall be held a competent juror, provided, nevertheless, that either the State or the defendant shall have the right to introduce evidence before the judge to show that the answers, or any of them, are untrue; and it shall be the duty of the judge to determine upon the truth of such answers as may be thus questioned.
If a juror shall answer any of these questions so as to render him incompetent, or if he shall be found by the judge to be incompetent, or if he shall be set aside for cause, the State or the accused may challenge the following objections:
That he is not a citizen, resident of the county.
That he is over 65 or under 21 years of age.
